TRADING BRISK BUT SPOTTY ON MONTREAL MART

Præzilian Led With Other Issues in Good Demand

UPWARD TENDENCY ON GOTHAM 'CHANGE

Transit and Fox Films up a Point, While Others Drop Fractionally

MONTREAL, Oct. 25.—Trading on the local stock exchange during the first hour this morning was fairly brisk, but spotty. Prices moved irregularly. Brazilian led the market and after opening at 100 1/2, up a quarter, advanced to 110, but in subsequent trading

touched 108 1/2, unchanged from Saturday's close. Steamships preferred came out at 85, up a quarter. Wayaganiack began the day with a loss of a quarter at 92 1/2. Asbestos Preferred was down a half at 77 1/2. Montreal Power lost a quarter at 74 1/2. Asbestos, in good demand, moved forward a quarter at 25 1/2, and Smelters was up a half at 23 1/2.

TAKES SECRET OF WEALTH WITH HIM TO GRAVE

"Old Joe" Was Once Noted Photographer in New York

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Funeral services for "Old Joe" Mora, who was one of New York's smartest photographers in the days of Ward McAllister, were held at the Church of Our Lady, and with him to his grave was the secret of half a million dollars he is suspected of having hid away.

For, though Joe's estate is valued at something less than \$500,000 at present, both David Godwin, his attorney and David Culin, manager of the Hotel Breslin, are inclined to believe that he tucked a much larger sum away from the reach of his friends.

Thirty or forty years ago "Old Joe" was in the mode as a photographer. He made "studies" of P. T. Barnum and Kit Carson.

Henry Ward Beecher, James G. Blaine, Dion Boucicault and Samuel T.ilden. But for the last 20 years he had hidden himself away in a room in the Hotel Breslin, where he kept four pigeons for company.

Some time ago his associates—what few there were—began to suspect him of hiding his wealth. He had once been the intimate friend of Jim Fiske and other financiers, and was supposed to have profited by these friendships. Yet he refused to spend more than fifteen cents on a meal.

Another thing that made persons doubt Joe's mental competency was the fact that he never took a bath, and what is more, did not believe in that institution. So a committee was appointed to pass on Joe's ability to care for himself.

The committee found him incompetent and his affairs were investigated. It was discovered that he had approximately \$500,000 in various banks and a careful search failed to disclose the huge sums he was supposed to have invested in Cuban and Long Island real estate.

Then Old Joe died in St. Vincent's Hospital. A search of his room revealed no will. The small sums that he left in New York banks including \$1,800 in a savings bank, will probably go to his only living relative, Mrs. Leopoldina Chaves of Havana, Cuba.

NON-SUPPORT CHARGED
Clarence N. Wood, aged 28, pleaded not guilty to a charge of not supporting his wife, in the Police Court this morning, saying that he paid money into the house all the time. His wife, Matilda, said that he did not pay over \$5 a week into the house, which was not sufficient to support herself and three children. The case was set over until tomorrow in order that Mrs. Wood could find out how much money it would take to support herself and her children.

Resignation Is Accepted By Doyle

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Oct. 25.—It was announced here today by S. P. Doyle, president of the Maritime Provinces Branch of the Amateur Athletic Association, that the resignation of W. E. Stirling as vice-president of the M. P. B. had been accepted. Mr. Doyle said he could not give the name of Mr. Stirling's successor until later, probably tonight.

KILLED IN RIOTING ABOUT SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Oct. 25.—One person was shot to death, two seriously injured and 14 wounded when hundreds of pro-Chinese radicals surrounded the west gate police station here early yesterday, and launched an attack, exploding two bombs and discharging firearms.

Police defending the station fired a volley overhead, making a head-on charge which dispersed the mob. The death of one and injuries to others probably resulted from shot which went wild.

The French municipal police, whose territory is adjacent to the west gate, stood by guarding French settlement boundaries. Chinese authorities are enforcing strict martial law, stopping and searching pedestrians day and night. Traffic was prohibited. Search was made of many houses in various Chinese districts in anticipation of outbreaks tonight.

Sir,—At this time when so much has been said about civic affairs, do you not think it would be out of place to review the past? We might take the water extension to Loch Lomond—under whose advice the present pipe was constructed, what was its cost, and what has been its upkeep? Do you not think before we adopt the much talked of city manager, we should take a look over the old aldermanic system of government, when our city was managed by two, viz. the late Mr. Murdoch and Mr. Wisely, one salary \$2,250, the other \$1,100, Mr. Murdoch doing all of Com. Wigmore's, Pink's, and part of Com. Bullock's work and Mr. Wisely the police, firemen, public lands; and, to make this letter short, asking Mr. Brittain's staff to go over the records and let us know in plain figures the number of staff employed in each department before commission government, also salaries paid. This no doubt would open the eyes of our citizens, when they see the amount paid our present commissioners is \$10,000 more than the old regime. This to my mind would cover the ground asked by the recall petitioners.
