DAILY GOOD TURN

District Secretary W. E. Hoyt writes: "Scouts cannot do better than follow the example of the old Knights of England, who made the British nation into one of the best and greatest the world has ever known. One great point about them was that they had to do a good turn to somebody every day, and that is one of the Boy Scout rules. When you get up in the morning remember that you have to be on the watch for a good turn during the day for someone. You may say, 'What good turns are there to do?' Well, here are some: Put a penny in a poor box, or to help an old lady to cross the street, or to make room on a seat for some one, to give a drink to a thirsty horse, or to remove a piece of banana skin from the street when it is likely to throw people down. No matter how small a thing it is, it is a good turn. This is only one of the many things you find in every day life if you only remember that you are a Scout and it is your duty to do at least one good turn every day. To remind yourself

of this fact an excellent way is to tie an extra knot in your neckerchief or handkerchief or turn your Scout badge upside down until you have done your good turn. Then at night think to whom you have done your good turn. If you find that you have forgotten to do it, you must do two good turns the next day instead. You are bound by your honour to do your good turn.

"And it only counts as a good turn when you do not accept any reward in return. Sometimes good turns are done by the different troops of the city and the different organizations for which they are done are very thankful for the services rendered. During the last week two good turns of different troops have been reported to headquarters and many other individual good turns which Scouts never mention because of the fact that 'doing a good turn' has become a custom to them and they only count it as a daily kindred. When a Scout does a good turn he does not go around telling the other fellow what he has done, but just complacently himself on living up to his Scout honor, as it is his duty to do so.

"And boys, do not forget that if you do one good turn, don't let it go at that, but be on the lookout for another one the next day.

FIRST AIDER

Qualifications for first aider proficiency badge for Cub and Scout packs. Must be able to bandage a hand in such a way as to stop bleeding, and be as aseptic as possible; know how to "clean up" and treat a graze. Know the treatment for sprains; and how to apply the wet bandage to a sprained ankle.

Know how to put on the large arm sling and the head bandage. Know the treatment for stopping bleeding from the nose.

Know how to extinguish clothes that have caught fire; and how to treat minor burns and scalds, grit in the eye, choking and sunstroke.

FORCED TO LEAVE BURNING STEAMER

Survivors at Montreal Tell of Heroic Deed by Crew Member

MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—A story of a captain who had to be taken forcibly from his burning ship was told today by survivors of the fire which destroyed the steamer Montreal this morning in the St. Lawrence River near Sorel with a probable loss of three lives. Intervenor was a tale of the devotion of a member of the crew, himself suffering from burns, who would not abandon his commander.

CAPTAIN LEFT BEHIND

One of the ship's boats had made a last trip ashore from the beached vessel with what seemed the last of the crew of 40, when it was discovered the captain was still on board. "I'm not going to let our captain die, I am going back. Who is coming with me?" Derry shouted. Three other men jumped in and rowed back to the ship, now a flaming mass, consumed almost to the water's edge.

"We found the captain in the water," Derry related when questioned. "He seemed to be bent on sinking with the ship and his face was a picture of despair. Half his body was in the water and he was hanging from one of the pulleys which had served to lower the life saving boat. We grabbed him forcibly and pulled him in. We then rowed to shore and I looked for a moment at the burning ship. I was weeping from the burns and I was wet through and through and the water on the burns made them ache so that I could scarcely stand the pain. I am glad that I am alive."

WANTED TO STAY ABOARD

"I will never forget how the captain kept his head," said another survivor, Derry, related when questioned. "He seemed to be bent on sinking with the ship and his face was a picture of despair. Half his body was in the water and he was hanging from one of the pulleys which had served to lower the life saving boat. We grabbed him forcibly and pulled him in. We then rowed to shore and I looked for a moment at the burning ship. I was weeping from the burns and I was wet through and through and the water on the burns made them ache so that I could scarcely stand the pain. I am glad that I am alive."

HOPE FELT FOR MISSING

All hope is not given up for the missing men. The Canada Steamships Company still hope that, escaping with little clothing they may have taken refuge in some cottage along the shore and still be there.

The missing men are Charles Edward Valois, St. Ignace, De Loyola, and Nicolas De Quebec, deckhand, and K. Lebeau, address unknown, deckhand. The loss of the lookout man is attributed to the fact that the fire broke out about the hour he was down below to wake the men who would have to handle cargo at Sorel.

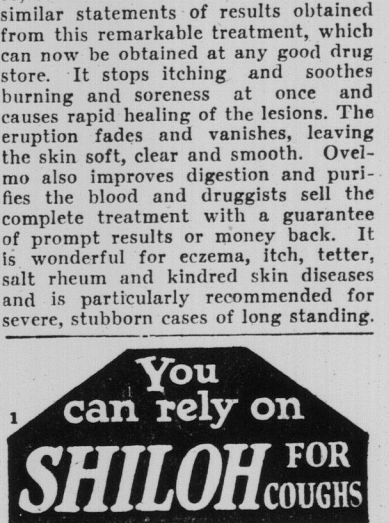
