## THREE-STORY BUILDING AT MONCTON BURNS

Frank Walsh & Co. and Flett's Studio, Moncton, Burned Out

STRUCTURE WAS ONLY WOODEN ONE IN BLOCK

Smoke Causes Damage to Other Stores in Vicinity; Strenuous Fight

MONCTON, June 15.—Police Officer Trives discovered a fire at 2:20 o'clock this morning in the three story wooden building at 725 and 727 Main street, occupied on the ground floor by Frank Walsh & Co. and in the upper portion by Flett's studio. He called out the fire departments by an alarm from box 21.

The fire which had secured a firm hold in the back store of Walsh & Co., spread rapidly and traveled with amazing speed through the entire building, the only wooden building in the block. The firemen were quickly on the scene and the motor from No. 2 fire station, reinforced by the chemical from No. 1, and the other apparatus, including the steamer from No. 3, the salvage corp and ladders, did effective work in preventing the spread of the blaze to the adjoining buildings.

**DENSE SMOKE**  
Two streams of water, one at the front and the other at the rear of the building, soon had the fire under control, although dense clouds of smoke continued to pour from the place, the fire eventually burst forth in a spectacular blaze. The axemen on the roof of the store of O'Neill and LeBlanc cut through the adjoining wall and were able to get at the heart of the fire.

The Salvage Corps, although unable to get into the store of Walsh & Co., confined their efforts to protecting the stocks of the adjacent stores, covering the furniture of Fairweather Brothers' drug store. The store on the other side of the burning building, occupied by O'Neill & LeBlanc, gens' furnishings suffered only from smoke damage, the fire and water not penetrating. Flett's photographic studio, over the store of Walsh & Co., was practically destroyed, it being impossible to remove the valuable cameras and other apparatus, which will be a total loss, partly covered by insurance.

The building, which is owned by Roderick McLean, is badly gutted. Mr. R. McLean was unable to state what insurance was carried, although he was of the opinion that it was at least partly covered.

**STOCKS TOTAL LOSS.**  
Frank Walsh, manager and proprietor of Frank Walsh & Co., said that as far as he could learn his stock would be a total loss, with insurance which would practically cover three-quarters of its value.

Frank Gallagher's tobacco store, Fairweather Bros' drug store and O'Neill & LeBlanc's gens' furnishings store suffered considerable smoke damage, and water flowing into the cellar of Fairweather Brothers' drug store caused some damage to the stock stored there, but an estimate could not be given.

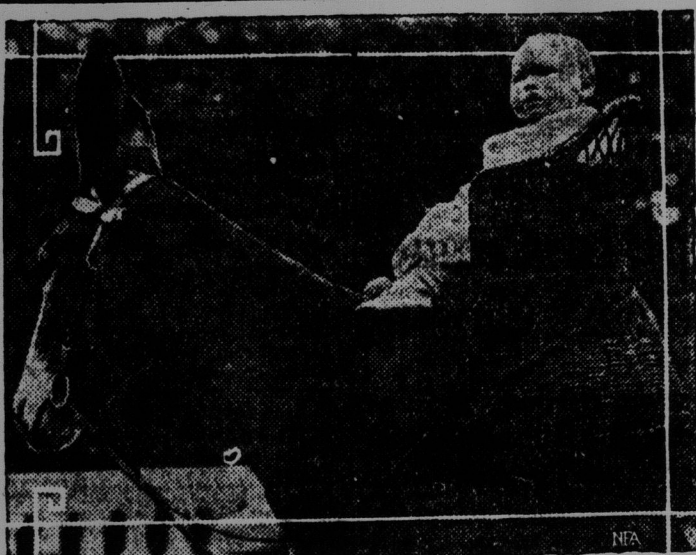

## BRAZILIANS CALM For New "Pep"

Take League Withdrawal With Varying Degrees of Interest

RIO JANEIRO, June 15.—The Brazilian public apparently having foreseen Brazil's ultimate withdrawal from the League of Nations, received the official news from Geneva with indifference. In some quarters indifference was indicated. Prominent Brazilians visited the foreign office and offered their congratulations. The governor states approvingly its course.

One of the significant features of the situation had been the anti-league campaign carried on by a group of newspapers which had consistently attacked the policies of the government. The foreign office now has received the unanimous approval of these organs.

A cable message from Sir Eric Drummond, secretary general of the League of Nations, acknowledges receipt of the notification of Brazil's resignation.

**Soviet Agency May Sue "Daily Mail"**  
LONDON, June 15.—Arcos, Limited, the Soviet trading agency in London, has written the Daily Mail, threatening an action for libel as a consequence of a recent article in that newspaper charging Arcos with being a propagandist organization to spread communism and alleging that some of its employees collapsed under the strain of walking to and from its office during the recent general strike. The article asserted that Arcos forbade its employees to use the improved transportation services during the strike.

**P. E. I. Section Man Thrown From Trolley**  
CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., June 14.—J. Watts, section foreman on the Canadian Railways here, suffered painful injuries this afternoon when thrown from a motor trolley on which he was riding with six others. The trolley passed completely over him. Watts was thrown off when an iron bar being carried on the trolley, dipped down far enough to catch on a sleeper and acting as a lever hurled him forward in front of the car. He was badly cut and bruised but is expected to recover.

**CONSIDERS COAL TENDERS.**  
After its regular session last night the Saint John School Board met in teachers committee to take up matters concerning the staff and to receive tenders for the coal supply in the coming season. It was midnight when the board rose and no decision had been reached with reference to the awarding of tenders. Seven city firms had tendered but in some instances there was a lack of desired information as to the quality of the coal referred to and it was decided to postpone awarding the contract until this information was supplied. No definite date was set for the next meeting to deal with coal tenders.

## POLISH DUEL LIKELY TO BE CARRIED OUT

Court of Arbitration Rules Skrynski's Challenge Quite in Order

WARSAW, Poland, June 15.—A duel between Premier Count Skrynski and General Szeptycki, growing out of a quarrel over the recent coup d'etat in Poland, may be fought, notwithstanding efforts in certain quarters to prevent it. When the question of a duel between them came up last week, it was suggested that the quarrel be referred to a mutual court of arbitration. Now the court of which Premier Ponikowski is chairman, has ruled that Szeptycki was unjustified in refusing satisfaction to Count Skrynski. The court says that Count Skrynski's challenge was issued "in strict accordance with the code of honor" within 24 hours after the dispute, which took place at Cracow. It is believed that Count Skrynski is ready to renew the challenge.

## CHURCH ARMY WORK BACKED AT TORONTO

TORONTO, June 14.—Endorsement of the work carried on by the Church Army of England and approval of efforts to extend the movement to Canada was given by an unanimous standing vote of more than 2,000 persons attending the Anglican mass meeting held in Massey Hall here.

An outline of the accomplishments of the army since its inception 45 years ago was given, the meeting by Rev. Frederick Wilson Carlie, 82-year-old leader of the movement. The members of the Church Army carry the message of the gospel throughout the fields and sparsely settled lands which are in a measure untouchable by the clergy, Mr. Carlie said.

## MARCONI HONORED

Italian People Celebrate 30th Anniversary of His First Patent

## SHOW IS BROKEN UP

## BLAST KILLS FOUR

Asphalt Mixing Tank at Standard Oil Plant in Illinois Blows up

ALTON, Ills., June 15.—Four men were killed and five injured in an explosion and fire at the refinery of the Standard Oil Company at Indiana, at Wood River yesterday. The explosion, the cause of which is unknown, occurred in the liquid asphalt mixing tank. The bodies of the men killed were burned so badly that identification was difficult. Damage to the plant was slight.

## Russian Gold Unit Is Now Stabilized

MOSCOW, June 15.—M. Bronsky, a member of the Finance Ministry, says that as an outgrowth of extraordinary measure taken by the Soviet government the Cherwonets, the new Russian gold unit of value, has now been definitely stabilized. M. Bronsky admitted, however, that campaigns against artificial devaluation of the Cherwonets had been put down with one energetic stroke. Three important finance ministry officials had been executed and about one hundred known speculators were deprived of their liberty.

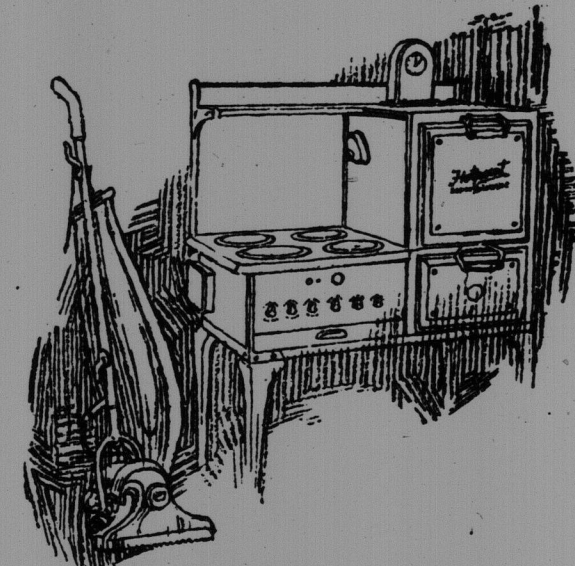

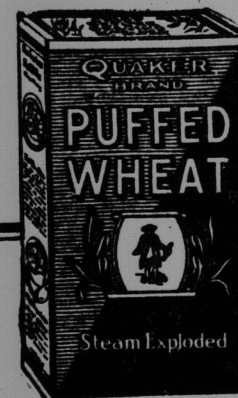
