

CALLS SMALLPOX SITUATION SERIOUS

U. S. Surgeon-General
Warns Country Against
Epidemic in 35 States.

Washington, July 24.—Apprehension over the growing number of smallpox cases throughout the country was expressed today by Surgeon-General Cummings of the public health service, who said the presence of the disease in 35 states threatened serious consequences unless state health officers exercise the greatest vigilance in vaccination and revaccination.

Dr. Cummings is particularly alarmed that the disease has spread so widely in the spring and summer months. If it is not checked, he fears a more serious situation next winter, during the season when usually it is most prevalent.

Warnings have been sent to all state health officers, to have the American Railway Association and to the American Automobile Association, urging that the greatest care be exercised to prevent a spread of the disease.

"There is grave danger of outbreaks all over the country," Dr. Cummings said today, "unless people are vaccinated."

Figures on smallpox cases for the week ended June 21, compiled by the health service, shows 36 states reporting 895 cases, as compared with 371 cases for the corresponding week a year ago. For the same week 100 cities reported 248 cases, as against 83 for the corresponding week in 1923.

The disease apparently is most prevalent in the midwest, with Cincinnati reporting 25 cases, Toledo 22, Indianapolis 45 and Detroit 66 for the week ending June 14. Baltimore reported 10 cases for the week and Hopewell, Ewing and Trenton, N. J., showed 18 cases, seven of which were in Trenton.

Although the health service has not received recent figures from Pittsburgh, Dr. Cummings said the epidemic in that city was serious.

The rapid spread of the disease is believed by Dr. Cummings to be traceable to lack of care in mild cases, which frequently develop into a more virulent form and to indifference to warnings by health officials.

IT'S NOT ALL JOY AS CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENCY

Locust Valley, N. Y., July 24.—John W. Davis, to use his own words, has discovered that the life of a presidential candidate is not a bed of roses. Mr. Davis announced his discovery during a recent speech here after a reception by his neighbors at Oyster Bay, which was much like the ovations that another man of the neighborhood, Theodore Roosevelt, used to receive.

The Democratic nominee caused laughter among his audience when he related the contents of two letters he said he had received since his nomination. One of them was from a man in Delaware who told of an old cobbler in a town of that State who had been a lifelong Democrat but who, since the convention, had announced that he "was a Methodist and a Prohibitionist, and would never vote for any man who had been president of a bar association." The other letter was from a man in Pennsylvania who assured Mr. Davis he was sorry to hear the nominee had been sued for breach of promise.

"He added that he knew the lady," said Mr. Davis, "and could tell me something about her that could help me in my defense."
