Reference was made in the Times a day or two since to the argument of Hon. Dr. Roberts before the Canadian Medical Association, meeting in Halifax, in favor of federal and provincial ministrations of health, and a public health programme for all Canada. Dr. Roberts discussed one other matter, and as many medical men from the central and the western provinces were there, his remarks were timely and to the point. He reminded them that the people of the Maritime Provinces were members of the Canadian family and had always been willing to bear their share of Canada's liabilities, in men and money, but that these provinces had not received due recognition from the people of the other provinces, and particularly those "who camp on Parliament Hill." Continuing, Dr. Roberts said:

"I want to say that we look at least, if not for favors, for our rights; and I am persuaded that every maritime province man in this assembly will support me when I say we are receiving everything else. And when I voice this sentiment it is absolutely valid of political coloring, for one party has aimed regarding this matter as much as the other. The moral to be deduced is that you who are visitors from all sections of Canada west of Montreal kindly bear in mind that we are your brethren in times of peace as well as in times of war. Start something that will result in a uniform development of this young nation of ours. Let your fellow countrymen realize that there is an eastern frontier to this country, and for the sake of Canada it needs a little more national attention than it has been receiving."

The people of the provinces by the sea will appreciate the force of Dr. Roberts' remarks, and coming from a member of a provincial government they could not but leave an impression upon the minds of the gentlemen from the other provinces. No opportunity should be lost to educate the people of those provinces in relation to the part the maritime provinces have played in confederation and the validity of their claims for better treatment.

At a conference in Boston on Wednesday it was stated that hundreds of babies in Massachusetts had died from lack of proper care in the hot weather of the past month. The conference was held to devise means to increase the number of public health nurses, whose work among families in congested districts would save many lives. The public health nurse should be regarded as indispensable in every community.

The Globe says harbor commission would transfer St. John harbor to the people of Canada. And who are the people of Canada? So far as harbor development at St. John is concerned, they are the people of Quebec, Ontario and the west, to whom the maritime provinces have been pleading in vain for fulfillment of the pledges of confederation. It is well that the Globe directs attention to the fact. Under the harbor commission act the people of Canada are not even called upon to pay a fair price for the harbor. It is a bargain counter offering.

PASSION PLAY MAY BANKRUPT OBERAMMERGAU

Villagers Anxious That Necessary 1,500,000 Marks Cost Will Not be Met—Choosing Characters for the 1922 Production.

Oberammergau, Bavaria, June 27.—(Associated Press, by Mail).—Thirty performances of the Passion Play have been scheduled for 1922 by the committee of 21 which is directing the spectacle, but this number will be increased if the attendance demands, and the case both in 1900 and 1910. It will require an outlay of 1,500,000 marks to stage the Oberammergau play and the villagers are extremely anxious about the German political situation, lest conditions be such that foreigners will not attend.

The 360 burghers, who constitute the descendants of the original peasants who made the vow to produce the play decently, personally assume the responsibility for this expenditure, and the cost would result in the bankruptcy of practically the entire village, as the Oberammergau folk have slight resources.

Most of the burghers are woodcarvers, potters, painters, sculptors, farmers, merchants and small shopkeepers. Only the descendants of the villagers who were saved from the plague in 1333 take part in the Passion Play and assume responsibility for its production.

Next October will be a fateful month for then the names of the villagers who are to have the leading roles in the spectacle will be announced.

To be selected to enact the role of Jesus Christ or one of the apostles is a far greater honor to an Oberammergau man than election to the presidency of Germany or any other office within the empire of the German people.

And any woman of Oberammergau would far rather be chosen to play the role of Mary or Martha or Mary Magdalene than to be in the position of Frau Elbert as mistress of the President's palace in Berlin.
