P. E. ISLAND CROPS

Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 29.—The crop report of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, shows that an average yield of hay is promised, although the season is late. Clover has suffered to some extent from winter injury. There will be an average crop of wheat. In the eastern sections the excessive rain and continued cold has had a backward effect. Oats will also be an average crop and in some localities there is an increased acreage. In some low lands damage has been caused by the unusually wet season. There is only a small amount of barley grown, but the present indications are for an average crop. The corn crop was late in being planted. Early potatoes are making good growth, and there will be greater acreage than usual. In some sections the root crops have not yet been planted. There is a good show for apples. The prospects for plums are unfavorable. There will be a good cherry crop and about an average crop of bush fruits. There is a brisk demand at high prices. The breeding of Karakul sheep for the raising of Persian lambs was initiated this spring. Already about sixty lambs have been born on the three farms controlled by the one Karakul Sheep Company.

Hogs are scarce, there having been large losses. Young pigs bring from \$8 to \$8.40 a pair from four to six weeks of age. There is a marked increase in the number of hens kept and more attention is paid to raising better bred poultry. There is being quite an increase in the supply of eggs. The egg circles have spread all over the province. Geese and turkeys have hatched poorly and there will be a scarcity. Cold weather kept the pastures back early in the spring, but growth has been quite rapid during the last few weeks. In general the supply of milk will be up to the average. Lack of pasture and some dairymen to reduce their stock, and in some sections there is a gradual change from dairy to beef cattle. The cheese factories were later commencing operations this year. Owing to the large number of public works in course of construction and other building operations, farm labor is scarce. The wages paid range from one dollar to \$1.60 a day and from \$18 to \$25 a month board.

CASSANDRA RESCUED THE PASSENGERS OF THE STEAMER CALIFORNIA

London, June 29.—A wireless message to the Malin Head station early today from the Anchor Liner California, ashore on Tory Island, stated that the vessel struck at 9:30 o'clock last night in a dense fog. In response to her distress calls the steamer Cassandra and three torpedo boat destroyers rushed to her aid.

The Cassandra and destroyers experienced some difficulty in locating the California, owing to fog and the treacherous nature of the coast. The destroyer Lynx was first to arrive and by aid of her searchlight the Cassandra was enabled to approach the California. The 1,016 passengers on the California commenced disembarking at daybreak, being taken aboard the Cassandra.

The officers and crew of the California were assisted by men from the three destroyers in transferring the passengers. The wireless sets on the California were in constant communication with the Cassandra, Malin Head station and the destroyers. The message confirmed earlier reports that no loss of life had resulted from the accident, or in transference of passengers to the Cassandra.

The California lies in a very precarious position on the rocky coast but it is expected she will be floated as soon as the weather sets in. Her crew continues on board, although the water has penetrated three of her holds.

The Cassandra is of the Donaldson line. The Robert Heford Co., Ltd., local agents for the steamer, received word this morning that the Cassandra, homeward bound from Montreal, and due at Glasgow tomorrow was standing by the California to take off her passengers and crew. The Cassandra and her master, Captain R. C. Brown, are both well known in St. John.

CORPS OF GUIDES IN ACTIVE WORK

New Feature in Military Training in Canada

START AT CANTERBURY

Seventy-five Men, Under Command of Major Mesereau of St. John, Start Sixteen Days Operations in New Brunswick

A new feature in military training in Canada is now being tried out for the first time under the direction of Major C. J. Mesereau of St. John, N. B., of the real estate firm of Mesereau and Kierstead, No. 6 detachment. Corps of Guides and a detachment of Major Mesereau met this morning at Canterbury station and will remain out for sixteen days taking a reconnaissance of the surrounding country to ascertain the facilities which would be available in time of war. The idea is also to train the men in this branch of military work as officers of the 4th division. The exact means of communication, telegraphic, postal and telephone connection. The members of the squad are all mounted. They will bivouac in the open and taking no tents with them. The force will be divided into sections, each one making by itself and it is the plan of Major Mesereau to work northward from Canterbury for about thirty miles to the frontier of the province. The same distance back and each day the different sections will bivouac where night overtakes them.

There are seventy-five men in the corps, accompanied by twelve officers. The officers are: Major Mesereau in command; Captain H. Clay, Springfield, N. S., adjutant and quartermaster; Major G. Sted, Chatham, N. B.; Major R. P. Goodwin, Baie Verte, N. S.; Lieut. A. D. Fraser, Springfield, N. S.; Major A. G. East, Guysboro, N. S., commanding the mounted company; Captain F. G. Goodspeed, St. John, N. B., commanding No. 1 section; Lieut. W. D. Taolt, Hopewell, N. S., commanding No. 2 section; Lieut. W. E. Fox, Chatham, N. B., commanding No. 3 section. Major R. Hayer general staff officer, the 4th division, and Captain L. H. Stillwell of the head quarters staff, Ottawa, accompanied the detachment.

No. 6 division, Corps of Guides is the division in the maritime provinces and has the honor of being the first to take up this branch of military work. Major Mesereau, who is the senior major of the corps guides in Canada, has been trying for some time to get the headquarters staff to give him permission to experiment with it. It proves successful at Ottawa yesterday and the present camp at Canterbury is more or less of an experiment. If it proves successful a survey of different parts of the country will be taken each year. The whole of the maritime provinces is covered, with the exception of the parts that are not in the same detachment will take up the same work in other parts of Canada. The information gathered at Canterbury will be a secret matter until after a copy has been taken at Ottawa, the records will be sent to London where they will be placed on file.

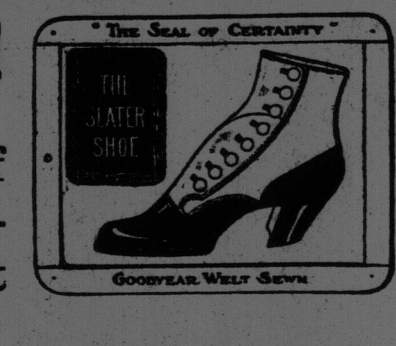
