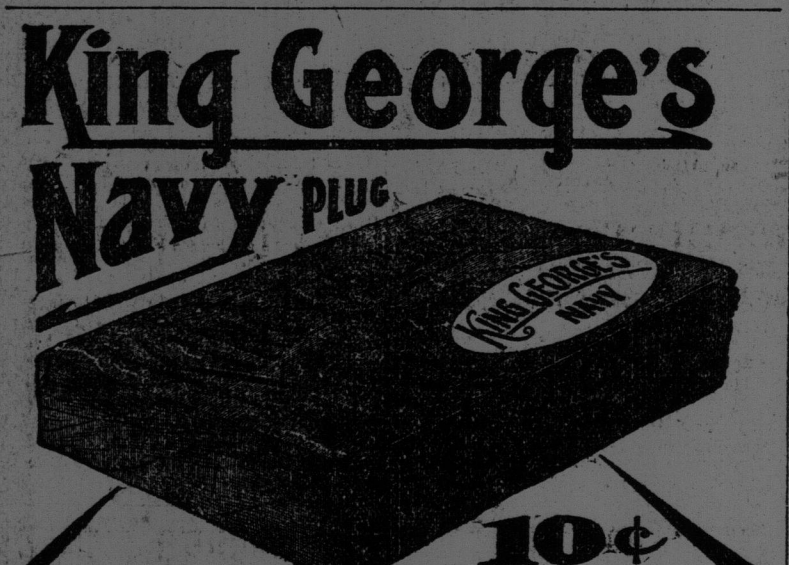

NAVY IN THE SENATE

Borden's Election Has Delayed
Granting of Aid for Year

SENATOR DANDURAND

Lloyd George Quoted to Prove
That There is No Emergency—
Loughheed For One Fleet, One
Army, One Exchequer

Ottawa, Nov. 27.—An important speech on Canada's present and future position in the British Empire was delivered in the senate today by Hon. Senator Loughheed, minister without portfolio and government leader in the upper house. Senator Dandurand replied forcibly, touching particularly the naval question.

Senator William B. Ross, of Middleton (N. S.), was introduced and took his seat.

Resuming the debate on the address, Hon. Mr. Loughheed congratulated the opposition and the senate generally upon the election of Sir George Ross as opposition leader. With the present constitution of the senate, he occupied a place of peculiar importance, for which his great ability and experience fitted him.

He said Canada was on the eve of prosperity which he believed Canadians generally were unable to appreciate. It was more appreciated by people from outside and the result was that the possibilities of wealth in Canada were being largely exploited by people from the United States.

Million Immigrants a Year Soon.
Immigration was increasing so rapidly that within a few years immigration would be coming at 1,000,000 a year. What this meant was startling. One hundred and forty thousand immigrants came from the United States last year, bringing with them an average of \$1,000 each, or a total of \$140,000,000, which was ten times the authorized capital of the largest Canadian bank. In addition, it was estimated that every immigrant in himself added not less than \$1,000 to the wealth of the country.

The immigration last year on the basis of the Quebec unit represented thirteen more members of the largest Canadian bank. Hon. Mr. Loughheed said that so great had been the success of the aid given to the provinces for the promotion of agriculture, that the government would probably increase the grants this year.

Speaking of the navy, Hon. Mr. Loughheed said the premier's visit to Britain last year had been commented upon in a friendly way. He was not open to criticism for not having made in England an announcement of his naval policy. The correct constitutional course required him to formulate that programme in Canada. Sir George Ross yesterday seemed to expect that Premier Borden should have stepped into the admiralty office with a check for the ten, twenty, thirty or forty millions, asked them to cash it, and go and buy a few Dreadnoughts with the proceeds. That would not have been a feasible or proper course. The proper one was that which was followed.

Sees Change of Feeling.
The naval bill would have already been before parliament if it had not been delayed by the prolonging of the debate on the address in the commons. When the bill was brought down, it was met with a feeling that Canada should do more. In the opinion of Hon. Mr. Loughheed a point had been reached when empire consolidation must take a prominent place in the consideration of British people. Since then, the feeling had grown that Canada should do more. Canada was as much concerned as was Great Britain in preserving the integrity of the empire. In his opinion this could only be done by a consolidation which would give one fleet, one army, one exchequer, administered by one imperial parliament. Australia, New Zealand and the Straits Settlements had already been given naval aid and today the eyes of the world are on Canada.

Senator Dandurand, who followed Hon. Mr. Loughheed, congratulated the country upon its prosperity and the present government with having reaped the benefits of the acts of the late government. Last summer there was a movement for unanimous action by both sides of politics to deal with the naval question. The two sides had agreed some years ago when a resolution passed parliament for the creation of a Canadian naval force.

The resolution provided for naval aid and at the suggestion of Hon. R. L. Borden, the "speedy" was put in, making the resolution definite for aid. This was passed in 1900, but in 1900 the Drummond-Athabaska election took place and the revolution provided for naval aid.

caused a change in the attitude of the Conservatives and Premier Borden moved an amendment calling for a plebiscite upon the permanent policy, while Mr. Monk demanded a plebiscite on any aid.

Two Wings to Satisfy.
Senator Dandurand said he did not know what mandate the Conservatives felt they had received from the people last election on this question. It could be better told when the bill came down. It was understood the government proposed an emergency grant to satisfy one wing of followers and later a permanent policy voted on to satisfy the other wing.

Was the emergency based on Germany's naval programme? But Germany had been building for many years, and like other nations would continue to build. It was absurd to say the situation could be permanently met with an emergency grant. The only way to provide aid was by a permanent policy such as had been proposed by the late government, which had called for tenders for ships to begin a Canadian navy. But for the result of the election the ships would now be under construction.

The success of Premier Borden had delayed for at least a year the granting of speedy aid. It had been intimated that emergency aid would take the form of a large gift money by Canada to the other country because Britain was no longer able to bear the financial burden of competing in the construction of armaments.

Senator Dandurand said he had been his privilege to hear the financial position of Britain stated last June in the British house by the chancellor of the exchequer, who had stated that in spite of great naval expenditures he had to report a surplus of many millions of pounds and the reduction of the public debt during the few years previous of over \$11,000,000. During the years that Britain had been keeping in the naval building race and reducing her debt Canada had been increasing her debt through building no navy.
