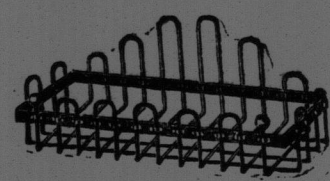

C. P. R. OPENS GREAT SHOPS NEAR CALGARY

World's Greatest Will Employ 2500 Men—Capacity 600 to 800 Locomotives a Year

(Montreal Gazette)
The C. P. R. has opened its new shops at Ogden, near Calgary, which are the largest railway repair shops in the world. The opening of these shops, which are called after one of the company's most popular officials, mark a new era in the railway industry of Canada and district, if not the Canadian west, for where less than twelve months ago was open, a vast, fertile land today there exists a great hive of industry. Sprung up around the new Ogden shops is the city of Ogden, which is very rapidly extending through the advent of the largest repair shops in the world. The C. P. R. has already expended several millions of dollars on the erection of buildings and equipment forming these huge and colossal works, but there still remains more to be done before the shops reach the state of perfection which is always a part of the policy of the C. P. R. The shops, which occupy 120 acres, are of the most modern construction, and contain the latest appliances used in the construction of the repair of a locomotive that the mechanical world has devised and constitute a group of twenty buildings, the locomotive works being by far the largest, occupying a space of eight acres. Eleven and a half miles from the city of Ogden, and C. P. R. turned out its first engine. Between five and six hundred men are now employed in the shops, but it will be about four months before they are in full working order, when it is expected that fully two thousand men will be found employed. The capacity of the locomotive shops, which will be used for the pressing of heavy work on the engines, will be between six and eight hundred locomotives a year.

FOR BETTER ROADS

A lecture on good roads was given before the members of the Provincial Good Roads' Association yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade Rooms by Mr. Van Scoy of the Canada Cement Company. The lecturer advocated the use of cement or concrete roads instead of Macadam, on account of its durability and economical upkeep.

W. F. Bonfield suggested the need of a change in the assessment to meet the requirements of road maintenance. Judge Armstrong said that he knew that good roads increased the value of property, but this was not realized by the property owners of St. John, who had petitioned against the proposed permanent pavements.

In introducing the speaker T. P. Regan, who presided, urged the advantage of better roads, and especially of highways connecting the more important centres.

MORNING LOCALS

Arrangements are being considered for the formation of a \$200,000 company to take over the patent rights and manufacture the reinforcing fabric controlled by C. S. Blackader who has been in the city for several days in the interests of the invention. If the plans are put into effect the St. John factory will supply the material for all of Canada.

Henry Holgate, chief engineer of the Atlantic Sugar Refineries, Ltd., arrived in the city yesterday to make an inspection of the work of constructing the foundations of the new plant. Professor S. A. Williams, of Wisconsin, passed through the city yesterday returning from Chester, N. S., where he has been making surveys of the pit, where pirates' treasure is supposed to be buried. He will return early in the summer and is confident of securing the treasure.

Mrs. W. A. Smith, of West St. John, has received from her cousin, John M. Marks, commissioner for Harmony, Indiana, a letter and papers telling of the damage done to his town by the tornado. The fire department responded to a false alarm from box 152 last night about 11 o'clock. It is thought the alarm was rung in from one of the connections in the I. C. R. yard.

The mystery concerning the disappearance of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Pickles and family has been cleared up. Rev. T. J. Deimel says he was talking to Mr. Pickles when he landed from the Tunisian at West St. John, and had seen his tickets which showed the destination of the family was Saskatoon, and not Montreal.

Schooner Eliza Burritt, formerly owned by Capt. J. W. Spicer, of Harberville, N. S., has been purchased by Captain Glasby of St. John.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL.
The members of the Trades and Labor Council last night condemned the mayor and commissioners for their refusal to call a public meeting in connection with the matter of increased house rents. The matter of immigrants coming here without the necessary money qualifications and of those who were induced to come here by misrepresentation was also taken up. The meeting was adjourned until the third Tuesday of the month. The eight hour day was approved.
