S., May 19.—(Special)—Word was received by the White Star officials in Halifax today that the steamer Montmagny had been unable to find any more bodies from the Titanic disaster, that she had abandoned the search and was returning to Halifax.

ANOTHER SHILOH CASE Portland, Me., May 19.—On Friday, Rev. A. A. Whittaker, of Shiloh, and one of the trustees of the Rev. Frank W. Sanford, were brought before Justice George F. Haley, of the supreme court, to answer to a petition drawn by William A. Conner, the attorney for his wife, Mrs. Florence W. Whittaker, asking that he be ordered to pay into court a reasonable sum for the support of his minor children pending the hearing in the fall of a bill for divorce brought by her.

THE SUFFRAGETTES' TRIAL London, May 20.—The case for the prosecution of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the militant suffragettes, and Mr. and Mrs. Pethick Lawrence, joint editors of Votes for Women, began today. Pethick Lawrence submitted that if there had been any conspiracy or incitement, it was the ministers of the crown, including the attorney-general, who had undertaken the present prosecution, who were guilty of it.

PRISON AND THE LASH Woodstock, Ont., May 20.—John Robert McKay, a prominent farmer of West Zorra, was today sentenced to ten years with fifteen lashes one month after sentence and fifteen lashes one month before expiration of his term, for a crime against his daughter.

BACK TO HALIFAX Montreal, May 20.—E. H. McCawland, charged with uttering forged cheques in Halifax to the value of \$150, will be taken back to that city tomorrow. He is an Englishman and has been in Montreal two weeks.

Upon searching for him his hat was found, and his body was soon brought up from the bottom. He was twenty-two years old.

BURGLARS BUSY IN CHARLOTTE CO. St. Stephen, May 19.—The post office, of which W. H. Boone is postmaster at Oak Bay, about six miles from this town, was entered early Saturday morning and \$8 in cash was taken. The grocery store in which the post office is kept was also relieved of goods and a small amount of cash. The thieves entered by way of a window in the post office which they pried open with tools they had stolen from the blacksmith shop of Harry Wilson. They first tried to cut out the large plate glass window and also bored several holes in the door but abandoned these attempts and went in by a rear window. LATE SHIPPING MONTREAL LIKELY TO HAVE BIG STRIKE. Montreal, May 20.—Ten thousand garment workers in Montreal will walk out within three weeks if the manufacturers do not accede to their demands within ten days from Friday last. The Union Workers are asking for a ten per cent. increase of wages and a nine hour day. They work ten hours a day now. Preparations which some of the manufacturers are making for bringing in labor indicate that it is not their intention to give the strikers any concessions. Only a small percentage of the city's garment workers do not belong to the union.
