The annual meet of the New Brunswick Tennis Association will be held this year on the courts of the Rothesay Tennis Club, Aug. 20 to 24. Entries have already been received from the Sackville, Fredericton, Moncton, Westfield, Rothesay, and St. John clubs, and an unusually large number of players are expected to take part. Joe Callahan of Dorchester, who played with the Boston Nationals last year is alternating at short and second base, while Frank Hoyt, formerly of the Athletics, is covering first. Frank Keane, who also plays short and second, is a Cambridge boy, and was formerly captain of the Bates College nine.

The right field territory is guarded by Bob Ganley of Lowell, a former captain of the Washington, D. C. team. As ball players and gentlemen the Boston boys are in high favor at the capital city of New Brunswick, and it is said that scouts from several of the American League teams have been watching the work of the players there.

BOSTON TAKES INTEREST IN FREDERICTON PETS.

Complimentary Words for Manager Duggan and His Team—Many New Englanders.

Patrick J. Duggan, son of Cornelius M. Duggan of Atlantic, well known in semi-professional baseball circles in and about Boston, has been signed by the Chicago White Sox. Duggan, who is 24 years old, has managed and captained the Fredericton, N. B. team of the New Brunswick League for the past two seasons, and will report to President Comiskey at the close of the New Brunswick League season on Sept. 7.

Young Duggan has played on the Atlantic and Neponsetts, and last year led an aggregation of Greater Boston baseball players to Fredericton. He captained and managed the team as well as playing centre field, and the team easily won the pennant. Fredericton is also leading the league this season, and bids fair to land another pennant. Duggan plays centre field and is reported a fielder and batter of exceptional ability. He is the second member of the team to sign with Major League teams. Dave Brown of Malden, a former Bates College star, having been secured by the Philadelphia Athletics a short time ago.
