**SALT IN THE BATH.**


Salt also is a good tonic for the skin. An ounce of ammonia mixed with the water is excellent for unstrung nerves. But ammonia is not very conducive to beauty, so it should not be used frequently.

Use of bran or cornmeal bags in the bath is very good for the skin. These not only soften the water, but also the skin, and they cost but a cent or two.

An excellent bath bag is made as follows:  
Make the bag from cheesecloth, and put a running string in it. Save all pieces of toilet soap, and when they are perfectly dry, pound to a powder.  
Mix four tablespoons of borax with four ounces of soap, and







## Cross-Word Puzzle




