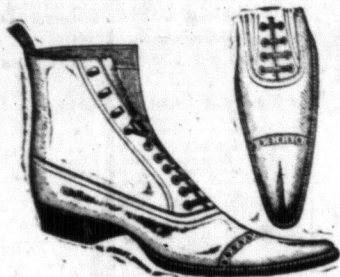

OLD WORLD NEWS

What is Transpiring in Other Parts of the Globe.

Interesting Matters Briefly Described in the Cable Despatches.

London, July 17.—A magistrate today ordered the destruction of fourteen tons of rotten fruit seized in the boiling room of Sir Thomas Lipton's jam factory.

DREYFUS COURT-MARTIAL.
Paris, July 17.—At a cabinet meeting the Minister of War, General de Gallifet, announced that the president of the Rennes court-martial had decided that M. De Beaupre, the former president of the civil section of the court of cassation, would be allowed to appear only as a witness on questions the court of cassation referred to the court-martial, and that he would not be permitted to formulate the charges.

RIOTING AT CHERBOURG.
Cherbourg, July 17.—Early this morning more arrests were made by the police station being besieged by a party of marines, who

demanded the release of their comrades. The windows of the station were broken. Soldiers, with drawn swords, pursued men who were engaged in feasting down lanterns after the national fete. The rioters in several places insisted to provoke the infantry of the line, by insulting cries. The troops, however, remained calm. Many persons were wounded during the rioting, but no fatalities were reported. Some of the riotous mob stripped a woman naked in the middle of the street, in spite of the efforts of the efforts of the populace to rescue her. Among the injured were a number of infantrymen.

GEN. PELLIEUX DISGRACED.
Paris, July 16.—The Libre Papele learns that General Pellieux was deprived of his command on the parade ground on Saturday evening. It is believed that General Pellieux will be relieved of all his functions. The minister of war, Gen. the Marquis de Gallifet, has ordered a new inquiry into the connection of Gen. De Pellieux with the Dreyfus affair. It is expected that this will result in his dismissal from the post of governor of the military department of Paris.

ANOTHER BIG STRIKE.

Street Railway Men in Brooklyn go Out-- Rioting Indulged in.

New York, July 17.—Nearly all the conductors and motormen of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company struck at five o'clock yesterday morning. Those who had cars out left them on the track. The company endeavored to run cars with non-union men on all lines, and there was much disorder. Wires were cut, rails torn up, non-union men hooted and stoned, and at the Marcy avenue stables a crowd of three hundred men resisted the police. Many arrests were made during the day. On some lines the company maintained a regular service, and on the others they failed altogether. Cars were unable to run to the Ocean Beach. The tie-up has not been nearly so complete as the labor leaders said it would be.

For some weeks past the employees on the several lines controlled by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company have been complaining that the management did not live up to the ten-hour law. The men demanded a revision of the time-tables at the different barns, and also claimed that they should be paid 20c an hour for overtime, which is equivalent to \$2 a day, the price of which they set for a working day of ten hours. Meetings have been held daily and nightly for the last week, and it was inferred from the reports given out by the employees and their advisers since

Thursday last that, while a strike was imminent, it would not occur for some days to come. General Master Workmen Parsons and District Master Workmen Pines had charge of the men's affairs, and a strike was called at half-past four yesterday morning. At this hour most of the motormen and conductors on the Brooklyn Traction Co.'s lines had completed their night trips, and the leaders decided that this was the most opportune moment to begin what was expected to be a stubborn fight with the Traction Co. The Smith street, Franklin avenue and Hamilton ferry lines, which are controlled by the Coney Island R. R. Co., having maintained the regular terms with their employees, were not impeded in the least, but on all other roads transportation was stopped for a while, and a good deal of congestion occurred in consequence. Shortly after midnight about 1,000 policemen from the precincts in Manhattan and the Bronx districts were conveyed to the different barns, and many were placed along the several routes. All the roads, with the exception of three, Green and Gates, Halsey and Putnam and the Fulton street lines, shut down at 7 o'clock last night by order of President Roosevelt. The three mentioned continued running until midnight, when they, too, were ordered to stop. The cars will run on schedule time to-day. Chief of Police Levery and Police Commissioners Hess and Sexton spent hours in Brooklyn completing the police arrangements for taking care of rioters.

DID THE BANK UP THESE SUCCEEDED

A New Jersey Cashier Wrecks His Employers.

Said to be Short \$100,000—Came Back and Gave Himself up.

New York, July 17.—The Middlesex County Bank of Perth Amboy, N. J., has closed its doors. Cashier George M. Valentine, was reported to be missing, with \$100,000 of the bank's money.

Cashier Valentine has been in the employ of the Perth Amboy bank for several years. He was considered a man of steady habits, and lived with his family in Perth Amboy. His family consists of his wife and two or three children. He is under 40 years of age. Cashier Valentine surrendered himself in the afternoon in Perth Amboy and is now in the Middlesex county jail. He said he was in New York this morning when he heard that officers were looking for him, and he immediately returned to Perth Amboy to give details about the shortage in his accounts except to say that he was sorry that he had got the bank into trouble and felt very badly for his wife and children. Mrs. Valentine called at the bank on Wednesday and inquired for her husband. She seemed surprised that he was not there. Her visit to the bank aroused suspicion and caused a hasty examination of Valentine's accounts which resulted in the discovery of the shortage.
