PEARY IN BOSTON

Stops Long Enough to Have His Picture Taken and to Talk With the Newspapers.
BOSTON, Nov. 27.—Commander Robert E. Peary passed a couple of hours in this city tonight on his long journey from the farthest north, 87.06, to Washington, where he hopes to spend Thanksgiving with his family. He was accompanied by Mrs. Peary who met him at Sydney when he landed from the Roosevelt last Saturday.
Commander Peary said that he should stop a few hours in New York tomorrow in order to see members of the Arctic Club and would leave for Washington in the afternoon. He will report at the Navy Department later in the week and may see President Roosevelt.
He said that he could not say whether he would make another attempt to find the pole. He reiterated his statements that his failure this time was principally due to the six days' storm and the unusually open weather last spring in the Arctic.
He was asked if he could not have made better progress by using canvas as did Nansen. In reply, Commander Peary said that it was not feasible to use canvas canoes with so large a party and that he was satisfied that his method of attacking the pole by a series of relay stations was the best. He pointed out that Nansen, in his dash had only a single companion, and the two were able to cross the open sea in their canvas canoes. The Peary expedition this year had a large force of men and dogs.
He said that he had no plans for the future as far as Arctic expeditions were concerned.
Commander Peary and his wife stopped long enough in the railway station after alighting from the train to have their pictures taken by a couple of newspaper photographers after which they went to a hotel for dinner and then went to the South Station where they boarded the midnight train for New York.

TRAIN CARRYING

CONVICTS AND GUARDS

Big Bunch of Prisoners Transferred to Federal Prisons in the South.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—A special train practically unique in the annals of railroading, left Washington this afternoon for Atlanta, Ga., over the Southern R. R., the passengers being eighty-seven federal prisoners from various state penitentiaries in the eastern states and forty-seven guards. The train will arrive in Atlanta tomorrow about noon and the convicts will be transferred to the Federal prison which recently was thrown open to government prisoners from all parts of the country.
FIFTY of the convicts came from Pittsburg, ten from Auburn, N. Y., twenty-four from New York, six from Northern N. Y., eight from Boston, nine from Trenton, N. J., six from Philadelphia and seven from Baltimore. On the train they were handcuffed in couples, each pair being allotted four seats so that they might make the long trip of 618 miles in comfort.
The prisoners ranged in years from 19 to 75 years.
Arrangements were made to give the guards and prisoners supper at Lynchburg, Va., and breakfast tomorrow at Central, S. C.
