MONTREAL WILL ALSO HAVE A DRY DOCK

MONTREAL, June 23—Montreal will have a dry dock after all. Hon. Mr. Brodeur and C. C. Ballantyne, harbor commissioner, dined together last night and the necessity for one for Montreal, whether Quebec had one or not, was pointed out to the ministering agreeing. The question whether Quebec will have one too, will be settled by the admiralty. The government thinks that a dry dock should be built capable of taking war vessels if needed and the site will be left to them to decide. This means that Quebec will be chosen.
