It is the heaviest of all the curses which can be heaped upon a man. It has made him as wicked as the rocks to ruins thousands of families. It has shattered many a domestic altar. It has shattered many a doleful burden of temptation, and has caused the irrepressible flood of remorseful tears.

Now, my brother, as the insanity of the man who was slain by sin, will you not come to that Christ who is able to take this sin out of your life? In the Bible we read that Christ was crucified for the sins of all men, and that he came out of a man. So great is Christ's divine power in this world, that he can take the sin of a man afflicted not only with a disease, but with a legion of four thousand devils, and he can take the sin of a man who was so goaded by this demonic passion that he was bound in fetters of chains, he would snap them as easily as a lion might.
