INSURANCE MEN IN ANNUAL GATHERING

Representatives of Metropolitan Life Co. From All Parts of Maritime Provinces Convened Here Yesterday.

The business of the convention was continued during the afternoon, and the majority of the visitors returned home last night.

PROGRESSIVES ARE IGNORED, DEMOCRATS SEVERELY SCORED

Saratoga, N. Y., Sept. 26.—The platform presented for adoption to the Republican State convention tonight praises the administration of President Taft and arraigns the Democrats, but practically ignores the Progressive party and its national and state candidates. In this omission delegates said they tried the influence of United States Senator Root, who had been the party's chief guide in the 24 hours of almost constant deliberations, that preceded the adoption of articles of faith by the committee on resolutions this evening.

The Republican platform mentions the Progressive party but twice, once to denounce the proposal to choose judges because of their known views on matters likely to come before them, and again in the preamble, which says, "a vote for the Democratic presidential nominee endangers national prosperity; a vote for the candidate of the Progressive party is equivalent to a vote for the Democratic nominee and proportionately as dangerous. The woman suffrage question, the platform would submit to the people as a constitutional amendment in 1915 unless a constitutional convention is held prior to that time.

OPTION TAKEN ON DROMOCTO LUMBER CO. PROPERTIES

Reported that Eastern Canada Lumber Company is Forming Alliance—Pulp and Paper Mill Perhaps.

With options being secured on many timber limits, and the company already in possession of vast timber limits, it is now reported that one of the largest lumber concerns in eastern Canada is forming an alliance with some rich corporation in which Old Country capital is said to be well interested, with the object of erecting and operating a big pulp and paper plant on the upper St. John river.

This statement does not refer to the proposed big pulp mill to be erected by the interests headed by Sir William Van Horne, at Grand Falls, but from all outward appearances at least the various deals which are now on will eventually lead to something of an extensive and important nature. The latest property on which options have been secured is that formerly owned by the Dromocto Lumber Company, and some time ago acquired by the Lowe syndicate.

At the Douglas boom operations for the season are closing today, and the Mitchell boom will probably continue work for about three more weeks, then clean up the work on hand. A crew of 20 men in charge of Robert Elliott are being transferred from Douglas boom to South Bay, where 3,000,000 feet of logs there which broke away from the Mitchell boom in the midsummer freshet.

FIVE MEN AWAIT DEATH IN JAIL OF THE METROPOLIS

Montreal, Sept. 26.—There are now five men under sentence of death in the Montreal jail. They are: John Cummings, for the murder of his wife on Nov. 21, 1911, to be executed Nov. 4th; Sylla Marchoff, for the murder of his sister-in-law, March 19, to be executed Nov. 16; Antonio Perduto, for the murder of Louis Hotte, to be executed Dec. 13; Domenico Bifano, for the murder of Louis Guay, on June 6, to be executed Nov. 29; Carlo Battaglia, for the murder of Salvatore Marcaruso, July 25, to be executed Dec. 20.

CONSUL GENERAL FOR MONTENEGRO IN DIFFICULTIES

Is Charged with Taking \$4,000 from Estates Left in His Care and Arrested by U. S. Authorities.

Duluth, Minn., Sept. 26.—Charged by the police with taking \$4,000 from four estates left in his care, V. D. Nikolic, general consul for Montenegro in the United States and Canada, was arrested here today. The consul, upon being taken to jail, declared that international law prohibits his arrest by civil authorities.

The charge against Nikolitch is equivalent to grand larceny. He waived examination and was bound over to the grand jury. In default of \$1,500 bail he went to jail. Bonding companies caused his arrest.

The prisoner says he has written to Montenegro for \$6,000, and that he will soon pay all obligations.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Sept. 26.—Harry Thorne, aged 28, was shot to death by the executioners at the state prison today for the murder of George Faehst, in a grocery store holdup two years ago.

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Hartford, Conn., Sept. 26.—Herbert Knox Smith, of Farmington, was nominated for governor by the progressive state convention here today. The nomination was by acclamation. Mr. Smith resigned a few weeks ago his position as commissioner of corporations at Washington to aid the Roosevelt campaign.

Ottawa, Sept. 26.—A sub-committee of the Cabinet has been appointed to consider anew the scheme of improvements to the dry dock.

No regular tender to build the dock as a subsidized private enterprise was received, and the latest proposal is to combine the dock construction with the contract for asra wharves and docking facilities. This plan was followed at St. John.

It is represented that with only the 3 1/2 per cent. subsidy it is very difficult, if not impossible, to finance the construction of the dock as a private undertaking.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE

Gurney Division Holds Rally to Mark Seventieth Year of Existence of Organization—Has Had Rapid Growth.

In the school room of Queen Square Methodist church last evening an interesting event was held when the seventieth anniversary of the founding of the order of the Sons of Temperance was observed. The attendance was large, the gathering being composed of representatives of the different temperance organizations of the city. Those present were: A. B. Bustin, president. An enjoyable programme consisting of addresses and musical numbers was carried out.

Among the temperance bodies represented at the meeting were: Albert Temple of Honor, Thorne Lodge I. O. G. T., Victoria Temple of Honor, Gurney Division, Grand Lodge, and the W. C. T. U., all of which attended in a body.

The musical programme included numbers by the spouses of other choir members, Rev. W. G. Galt, Mrs. J. W. Soy, Rev. W. R. Robinson, Rev. Wm. Lawson, L. B. Cronk, Bennet W. Wilson, E. N. Stockford and E. S. Hendrick. Mr. Hendrick in his address dealt in an interesting way with the founding of the Sons of Temperance in this city and reviewed the progress made by the organization throughout the province.

The order of the Sons of Temperance was founded in the United States in 1842. In 1847 members of the organization crossed the border into New Brunswick and in 1848 the first New Brunswick division was inaugurated in St. Stephen. Shortly afterwards the order spread to other parts of the province, and in May, 1847, the St. John division, or Gurney Division, was founded. It has since that time had a very considerable and divisions are to be found in several parts of the province. The membership for the year closed on Sept. 1st, 1912, was 3,000 and during the 65 years of which it has been in existence Gurney Division together with the other divisions has played a prominent part in the cause of temperance.

Samian Insurgents Attack Vathy But are Repelled—British and French Cruisers Protect Foreign Property.

Constantinople, Sept. 26.—According to advices from Samos, sharp fighting has occurred between the insurgents and the British and French garrisons. The British and French cruisers have landed forces to protect the consulates and foreign property. It is said, however, that after the arrival of the Turkish reinforcements the insurgents retired to the hills.

A commission will leave here tomorrow for Scutari, Albania, to investigate the causes of the insurrection of the Mallisori tribesmen.

Mr. Fox brought out the qualities of the new organ in a masterly manner, and his work, as well as that of the others who took part in the programme, was much appreciated by an audience which filled the church to the doors. After Mr. Fox had played the Processional March from the Queen of Sheba, and selections from Offenbach and Lemare Mrs. F. C. McNeil sang "Eg Huth Not Seen" (the Holy City), receiving a good reception. Mrs. D. M. Douthwaite then sang the Shepherd of Hours, and responded to an encore with "Angels Guard These Mrs. Douthwaite has a fine presence, and a mellow soprano voice. This was her first appearance before a St. John audience. She showed a rare power of expressing feeling, and made a fine impression on her audience. D. B.
