## CIRCUIT COURT.

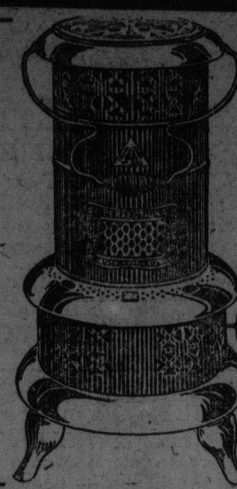

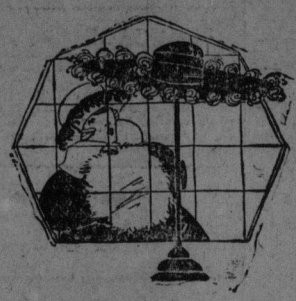

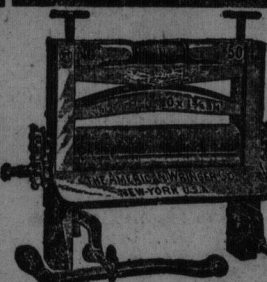
