their first intercollegiate League
game only ten days away the U. N. B.

include unusually promising material
this season, were beaten by the newly
organized Fredericton City team at
College Field this afternoon by a
score of 9 to 5. It was purely an ex-
hibition game and was not advertised
and earned to show the red and black
football hopes in an apparent state of
disorganization, evidently state and lack-
ing even in the fundamentals of Rugby
after a solid month's training.

Started Many Races.

A resume of his season's work
shows that he has started 129 races
and 480 heats, and in all that work
has given general satisfaction.

His First Start.

Mr. Power first officialized as starter
at a trotting race given in connection
with a Military Gymkhana held on
the riding grounds at Halifax, August
26th, 1889, and has since acted at
almost every prominent meeting in
the maritime provinces. For years
he has filled the position at the Hal-
ifax and Charlottetown annual exhibi-
tions. His great success is due to
the fact that while he brooks no delay
he is particular to see the horse be-
fore he gives the word, and has often told
the writer that in his opinion it was
more important to have horses on their
strides going away than to have
their noses even at the wire. He
treats everybody alike, while he
knows the rules thoroughly and uses
the best judgment in applying them.
During the past season he introduced
some innovations, one of which
was the drawing of positions at 11
a.m. each day, which proved satisfac-
tory to horsemen and spectators as
it did away with the delay of draw-
ing after the horses appeared, and
thereby gave more time for racing
during the afternoon.

He is now making dates for next
season, and has already accepted re-
turn engagements from some of the
tracks he has worked on this season.
Track managers requiring the services
of a competent, experienced starter
for next season would do well to com-
municate with Mr. Power at once.

Danger In Sex
Equality IdeaColonel Freemantle Thinks
Independence of Women
Tends to Destroy Family Life

London, Oct. 18.—The independent
career is so attractive that it is pass-
ing marriage to the wall, in the opin-
ion of Colonel F. E. Freemantle, M. P.
for the Conservatives, who is advocat-
ing the health of the nation by im-
proving its morals. Colonel Freemantle
voiced this opinion when he spoke
at a meeting of the concluding ses-
sion of the Royal Sanitary Institute
Congress, which discussed sex hy-
giene.

"The whole outlook of the Nation,"
he said, "tends more and more to
government by bachelors and spin-
sters, men and women who have not
the right to marry."

"The result is that girls grow up to
seek independent careers, to live inde-
pendent lives, with the result known
to all of us, and so on, and so on, and
earn incomes which make marriage
unattractive. The result is in-
creasing sterility and race suicide."

"The movement for sex equality is
becoming a movement for the aboli-
tion of sex, at a time when the na-
tion calls for healthier children and
many more of them."

Mrs. E. M. Broome, South Wales,
suggested that instruction in the rear-
ing of children could be given by com-
pulsory attendance at lectures illus-
trated by the cinema, so that parents
might learn the best way to bring up
children.

Hasty Marriages.

"The present day rush for marriage
without any real knowledge of char-
acter and antecedents is probably the
reasons for the demand for divorce
law reform," said Mrs. Broome. "Many
parents, even the wealthy and well-
educated ones, are willing to give
their daughters to men who, for all
they know, are adventurers, while if
they were engaging a chauffeur they
would seek for a proper reference."

The Marriage Defence Council and
the Reform Law Reform Union were
constant war on one another. What
ever one says the other contradicts.
If they were husband and wife the
courts would be called to order to
announce a separation between them
and bind both over to keep the peace. As
it is they enjoy privileges not allow-
ed to the merely married and can carry
on the argument to the bitter end.
So far there has been no last word
and there is no possibility of predict-
ing when there will be.

The latest statement from the Mar-
riage Defence Council strongly at-
tacks the Divorce Bill, which recent-
ly passed the House of Lords in the
face of the most moving appeal of the
venerable Lord Halifax, whom though
enfeebled by his ninety years of life,
made, with great effort, his last ap-
pearance in the Upper House, to plead
for the "stability of Christian mar-
riage."

Easy Divorce.

The statement says: "If this meas-
ure passes the House of Commons fa-
cilities for divorce will be granted in
England and Wales such as very few
other countries possess. In those
countries where such facilities have
been granted against this legislation,
which is generally recognized as be-
ing disastrous to the welfare of so-
ciety, has already made itself felt, and
efforts are being made to restrict the
facilities for divorce. The Bill be-
fore Parliament at present is said to
be in satisfaction of a general demand
from all classes in England for a re-
laxation of the present law. There is
no evidence of this general demand.
Indeed, we have reason to believe
that many women's organizations and
the great mass of the people regard
with suspicion any attempt to tamper

CHARLES H. WEBB
HAS PASSED AWAYEx-Alderman of Sunny Brae,
in Poor Health for Months,
is Dead.

Moncton, Oct. 18.—The death of ex-
Alderman Charles H. Webb of Sunny
Brae this afternoon came as a shock
to his friends in Moncton and else-
where. He was sixty three years of
age last March and had been in poor
health for some time. On December
27th last he was compelled to give up
his position because of the state of
his health and had been confined to
his home most of the time since. A
trip to Montreal to consult a special-
ist brought no relief. He was a mem-
ber of the Central Baptist Church,
Moncton, a charter member of Ardis
Lodge No. 116 I. O. O. F., Sunny Brae,
and a member of Keith Lodge A. F.
and M. M. Moncton. He was well
known to old-timers in Eastern Can-
ada. Being a man of much public
spirit he served as alderman on Sun-
ny Brae's first council board, 1915-1916
and later became chairman of the
Housing Commission. He was a na-
tive of Bermuda, son of the late Rich-
ard Webb of that colony and came to
Moncton forty years ago. He work-
ed with T. E. Taylor, grocers. Later
he engaged in the grocery busi-
ness for himself in partnership with
the late John McElaffie. When this
partnership was dissolved he moved
to Humphrey's Mills where he was
for years manager of the grocery
business of J. A. Humphrey and son.
Later about seventeen years ago he
accepted a position in the store of
Sumner Co.

with the status and security of mar-

"There are the gravest reasons for
fearing that this Bill is only an instal-
ment, which will be followed by far
more drastic measures, for not only
does the Bill draw purely arbitrary
and illogical distinctions as to what
shall or shall not constitute grounds
for divorce, but its author, (Lord
Buckmaster) has admitted that he
himself would like to go much fur-
ther."

No opposition by those who hold
our views has been offered in Parlia-
ment to the proposals in the Bill for
equalizing the rights of the sexes and
rendering divorce no more difficult for
the poor man than the rich. We are,
however, strongly opposed to changes
being made for the worse in the sta-
tus and conditions of marriage. We
wish to check the tendency to injure
the interests of numberless men, wo-
men, and especially children, for the
sake of a very small number of hard
cases.

FITZGERALD'S
BODY CARRIED
TO THE CHURCHHunger Striker, Who Died in
Cork Jail, Borne from Prison
on Shoulders of Friends.

Cork, Oct. 18.—Borne on the shoul-
ders of six volunteers from Fermoyn
the coffin containing the body of Mich-
ael Fitzgerald, one of the hunger
strikers in Cork Jail, who died yester-
day, was removed from the prison to-
night and carried to a church. Here
the body will lie until noon tomorrow,
when it will be taken to Fermoyn for
burial.

A large crowd assembled outside the
jail to witness the event. When the
coffin-bearers reached the street the
crowd fell in behind the coffin and
marched to the church. Outside the
pension door the Irish Republican flag
was spread over the casket. Several
lorries filled with military and police
were stationed at the prison. Al-
though about 300 volunteers marched
in the procession.

Constable Killed.

Ennis, County Clare, Oct. 18.—One
constable was killed and two were
wounded during a battle today with
raiders, who attacked the Ruan police
barracks, near here. The other con-
stables are missing. The raiders
seized all the arms and burned the
barracks.

DROPPED DEAD
IN ENGINE ROOMJohn Cummin, Formerly of
St. John, Later of Yarmouth,
Died on Steamer La Tour.

John Cummin, chief engineer of the
steamer La Tour, dropped dead in the
engine room Sunday when the steam-
er was on the way from Halifax to
Yarmouth. He was 78 years of age,
and a native of St. John, N. B. but had
resided in Yarmouth for many years.
