CONDENSED NEWS; LOCAL AND GENERAL

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The deposits for December in the government savings bank here were \$27,696.76 and the withdrawals \$4,807.68.

Fenwick W. Crawford, of Hampton (N. B.), is serving with the machine gun section of the West Kent Yeomanry and is applying to join the Canadian contingent—Canadian Gazette.

Stephen O. Humphrey, J. J. William Martin, Marc H. Boudreau, John H. Harris, and Antoine J. Leeger of Moncton, are applying for incorporation as the Moncton Leather Manufacturing Company, Limited, with an authorized capitalization of \$80,000 and head office in Moncton.

The plant of the New Brunswick Pulp & Paper Company at Millerton (N. B.), eight miles from Newcastle, was totally destroyed by fire Friday morning, at a loss estimated at \$150,000, and of the many buildings the chemical plant and a portion of the mill house remain standing. There was heavy insurance on the place, and the majority of it is held by St. John firms.

Private Victor Albert Baker, a young member of the Canadian force, formerly a P. R. engine driver, was married last week to Miss Bertha Wenden Bosh, a pretty Belgian refugee, at the Linden Grove Congregational church, Nunhead. The mayors of Camberwell and several aldermen and councillors were present at the romantic event, as well as the bridegroom's father, who is also with the contingent. The bride is to go to the home of her husband's parents in Canada to await his return from the war—Canada.

Their 1915 New Year's dinner will long remain in the memories of the men of the 26th New Brunswick battalion. It was the first time that the whole battalion, practically, has been able to meet for more than the regulation rations of the army which they are now part and parcel. Good things had been served up to many of them on Christmas day, but the real "get together, tuck in and don't be afraid of it" feast came last night, when the mayors and corporation of St. John entertained the officers and men to a splendid spread.

A concert and basket social at Armstrong's hall, French Lake, on Christmas evening for the Belgian fund, secured a total of \$70 for the fund. The sale of hats, made \$250, prices ranging from fifty cents to \$2.75, the sale of refreshments made \$370, and the voluntary subscriptions \$18, which, with the admission made for total \$1,075. W. Wood and Myrtle Stennick acted as secretaries. It was an extremely satisfactory result. A vote of thanks to Mr. Armstrong for the use of the hall was passed.

From a statement prepared by Dr. George C. Melville, medical health officer, it is shown that during the year 1914 there were 798 deaths, forty-six fewer than in the year 1913. Diseases accounting for the total were: Typhoid 1914, while during the year previous they aggregated ninety-eight more. The death rate per thousand during the year was 19.30. Diseases which caused 551 persons were vaccinated at the board of health, the majority of whom were children just entering the public schools. The reports show a decrease in diphtheria, typhoid and almost a complete absence of measles.
