THREE LARGE INDUSTRIES WANT TO LOCATE HERE

Two Iron Industries and One Furniture Factory May Build in Waterloo.

There is much activity being shown in industrial circles these days and, if the efforts that are being put forth by Mayor Kutt, Mr. Allen Bechtel, President of the Board of Trade and Mr. E. Haberer, Secy. of the board, are successful, industries on a large scale will be erected in the Town of Waterloo. At the present time negotiations are on for the securing of three large industries. One is a furniture factory, the other two are iron industries. We understand that the one firm is ready to locate immediately and from the start will employ 50 men and in a short time this number will be doubled. The securing of concerns of this kind, where men only are employed, is what is badly needed in

tending to help other industries where girls are employed.

In conversation with Mayor Kutt he felt very anxious that all three factories would locate in town in fact the gentleman behind the scheme is already here and ready to talk business and a meeting is being held today when the matter will be further discussed and something definite decided on. The above three gentlemen have been quietly working on the securing of new industries and it looks now as if their efforts would be rewarded by the erecting in town of industries of the above nature. It could not be learned who the firms are who wish to locate here, the committee preferring to withhold this information until all arrangements are completed.

UPHOLSTERERS HOLDING OUT

The situation in regard to the striking upholsterers seems to be at a deadlock. Mayor Kutt has endeavored to have the firms and men get to-

gether and settle their differences but his efforts have apparently been of no avail. He personally took the matter up with the manufacturers while they were willing to make certain concessions the demands of the men in full were denied and from present appearances they seem to be no nearer a settlement than both sides were a week ago. One notable feature of the strike is that while the men are persistent in their demands they are going about it in a quiet, decent way and this method will be carried out to the end. Quite a number of the men have left town having secured jobs elsewhere and unless a quite settlement is soon arrived at the majority of the men will remove from the town city. It is rumored that several of the firms are willing to meet the men and accept the terms and it is to be hoped the calling off of the strike will be announced in a few days.

The funeral of the late Conrad Becker was held yesterday afternoon and was attended by a large concourse of sorrowing friends and relatives. The solemn cortege left the residence on Elgin Street and wended its way to St. John's Lutheran Church where a most impressive memorial service was conducted by the pastor Rev. E. Beckelmann after which internment took place in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery. The pall bearers were Messrs. Jacob Koenig, W. Johnston, W. Veitel, W. Thuro, Jacob Brox and H. A. Ziegler.

Another Stirring Message by Dr. Conant

Of all the hyperboles on earth, the man who is trying to get to heaven on a moral life leads the list, said Dr. Conant at the Benton St. Church last night.

He said he was glad to acknowledge the value of morality in a man's relation to his fellowmen and wished there were many more of that sort than there are. "But he continued, 'when a man tries to drag his morality into his relation with God he is trying the impossible. His relations to God are spiritual, and spirituality is heaven higher than morality.'

Continuing, Dr. Conant said, "If some sort of spiritual X-ray should be thrown on your life so that your secret history should become fully known to your fellow men, would you be ashamed? You are not ashamed of your outward life, but are boasting of it and depending on it to get you into heaven. Now if you are boasting of the life you see, and are ashamed of the life you do not see that proves to a demonstration that your morality is not the same all the way through, and so it becomes nothing but a transparent sham and a lying pretense and makes you the champion hypocrite of earth."

"And besides that if you would be ashamed of your inner secret life before men, now can you expect to take that life into the presence of God, who is of infinite holiness, and yet be ashamed? The devil stuffed this champion lie down your throat when he told you that you could get to heaven and feel perfectly at ease when you get into the presence of a holy God with the new same life that you would be ashamed of in the presence of a holy God with the very same life that you would be ashamed of in the presence of your fellowmen."

"But there is a way out of this situation. If you will come to Christ He will wipe out the stain of all your secret history and bring you at last into the presence of God in perfect confidence."

WHEN IS AN EGG FRESH?

By the provisions of a newly-enacted law in the State of Pennsylvania eggs sold as "fresh" must hereafter be really fresh and a reasonable definition of the word has been officially adopted. In a special session of the State Board of Chemists, of which an account has recently been sent out in the form of a press bulletin, it was demonstrated that the identification of eggs as fresh or stale under the official specifications is a matter of no great difficulty. Samples of eggs had been collected by Agent Simmers of the Philadelphia district who had full data concerning every sample submitted. They covered a range of cold storage eggs of several ages, one-day old eggs, western fresh eggs, and eggs preserved by several well-known methods used in household practice. These samples were submitted under number only to the group of chemists for decision as to their character, and in every case they were correctly classified for interpretation of the provisions of the newly-enacted fresh egg law. We read in the bulletin:

"As each sample was submitted the chemists individually made their decisions which unanimously agreed in each case, and as each result was announced, Mr. Simmer's facts regarding the origin of the particular sample were stated and were found absolutely to confirm the decision arrived at by the chemists as to the age of the eggs."

"The factors which are taken into account in classifying eggs as to their freshness are the size of the air space in the specific gravity, the condition of the white and of the yolk after 'opening' the appearance of the chalazae, besides various confirmatory wanted teamster. 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NURSING SISTERS PLAY BASEBALL

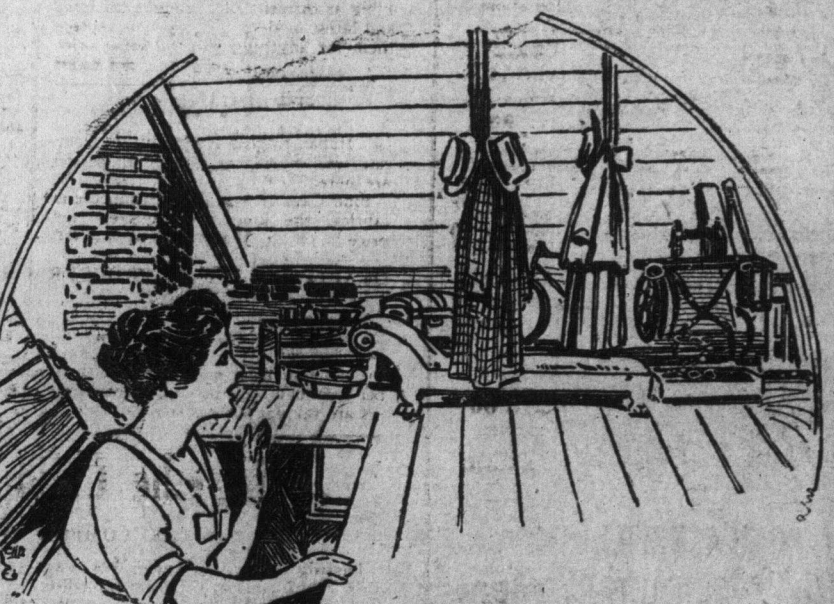
