A claim may yield \$100,000, of which amount one quar ter has been required for development purposes. Another claim may produce only \$50,000, and the same amount be spent in operating it as in the case of the first. Thus it will be seen that the interests of the greatest number of people are best subserved when the yield of the district is distributed among many claim operators rather than when it is confined to a few


