Indians in Police Court.

Hearing of the charges of criminal assault and theft, preferred against Solomon Polches and Robert Brooks, respectively, two Indians from the St. Mary's Reserve, Devon, were stood over this morning until this afternoon in police court by Judge Walter Limerick. Clerk of the Peace G. T. Peeney appeared for the prosecution while both prisoners were represented by J. B. McNair. Polches is charged with criminal assault upon an Indian girl while Brooks is alleged to have been one of a trio of Indians who participated in the robbing of William Tibbets and seven Hughes, of Devon, of the sum of \$5 while en route to the district known as the Black Hills.

Paid Fitting Tributes.

At St. Dunstan's church yesterday morning Very Rev. F. L. Carney asked the prayers of the congregation for the repose of the soul of Sister Mary Valerie, who died in Brooklyn, N. Y., last week and in doing so paid a fitting tribute to the deceased, who before entering the Monastery of the Precious Blood was Miss Margaret Sweeney, of this city. He said among other things that in looking up the church records to find out when deceased was born, he found the name of another young woman who was born the same year as Sister Valerie, 1878, and had died in the religious life, Miss Sarah Davies, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Davies of this city, and who died in a Hall at convent some years ago.

TAX COMMISSION
REPORT POSTPONED
UNTIL NEXT WEEK

Greatest Changes Proposed to Affect Taxation of Stocks and Bonds.

REPORT IS NOT YET
READY FOR COUNCIL

Taxpayers May Be Required to File Statement of Holdings.

Fredericton's proposed new assessment act will be submitted to a special meeting of the City Council sometime next week when a meeting of the council will be called for the purpose of taking up the draft of the act and consideration of the accompanying report of the civic commission on taxation and assessment.

Ex-Ald. J. Bacon Dickson, chairman of the commission, said to-day that the commission's report was not ready for submission to this evening's regular meeting of the City Council but that the report and the draft of the new assessment act prepared by the commission would be complete within a few days. Arrangements are being made to-day for the holding of a special meeting for the specific purpose of taking up the commission's report.

While the chairman of the commission was reticent with respect to the changes in the act which will be recommended in the report, he intimated to-day that the greatest changes proposed would be those with respect to the assessment and taxation of intangible property such as stocks and bonds which are not at present taxed, to any great extent. Lack of information regarding such intangible property will probably be remedied by provisions requiring the rate payer to make a declaration of his holdings in this respect.

Motor Fire Truck Hit

John O'Neill, of the C. P. R. freight office in this city, had a narrow escape from serious injury if not total injuries on Saturday day night when the bicycle he was riding was struck by the motor truck of the fire department while on its way to answer a false alarm of fire.

The collision occurred at the corner of Brunswick and Carleton streets, and Mr. O'Neill was thrown from his wheel but was not seriously injured. The wheel was smashed when the truck went over it.

OVER 8 INCHES RAIN
FELL IN OCTOBER

Heaviest Rainfall Since 1900 When 10.6 Inches Fell.

The total rainfall for the month of October was 8.02 inches which is the heaviest rainfall for the month in twenty-five years. In October, 1900, 10.6 inches of rain fell, and all railway traffic was tied up for several days. The heaviest rainfall for the month previous to that was in 1888 when 9.5 inches fell, making the three heaviest rainfalls for the month of October since records have been kept at the University of New Brunswick.

The coldest day was on Saturday when the temperature reached thirty-one above zero and the warmest day was the second when the mercury ran up to 66. The statistics for the month are as follows:
