PUBLIC PAPERS.

Copy of a Convention between His Majefly and the United States of America, figured at London, January 8, 1802.

Difficulties having arisen in the execution of the fixth Article of the Treaty of Amity, Commerce, and Navigation, concluded at London on the 4th day of November, one thoufand feven hundred and ninety four, between his Britannic Majesty and the United States of America, and in confequence thereof, the proceedings of the Commissioners under the feventh article of the same Treaty having been fuspended, the parties to the faid Treaty being equally defirous, as far as may be, to obviate fuch difficulties, have respectively named Plenipotentiaries to treat and agree respecting the same, that is to fay: His Britannic Majesty has named for his Plenipotentiary, the Right Hon. Robert Banks Jenkinson, commonly called Lord Hawkesbury, one of His Majesty's most honourable Privy Council, and his Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; and the President of the United States, by and with the advice and confent of the Senate thereof, has named for their Plenipotentiary Rufus King, Esq. Minister Plenipotentiary of the faid United States, to His Britannic Majesty, who have agreed to and concluded the following articles:-

ART. I.—In fatisfaction and discharge of the money which the United States might have been liable to pay in pursuance of the provisions of the fail fixth article, which is hereby declared to be cancelled and annulled, except so far as the fame

may relate to the execution of the faid feventh article, the United States of America hereby engage to pay, and His Britannic Majesty confence to accept, for the use of the persons described in he fail fixth article, the fum of fix hundred thousand pounds sterling, payable at the times and place, and in the manner following; that is to say, the said sum of six hundred thousand pounds fte-ling, thall be paid at the city of Washington, in three annual instalments of 200000 pounds sterling each; and to fuch cerfon or perfons as thall be authorised by His Britannic Majesty to receive the fame; the first of the faid instalments to be paid at the expiration of one year, the fecond intalment at the expiration of two years, and the third and last instalment at the experation of three years next following the exchange of the ratifications of this Convention. And to prevent any disagreemen, concerning the rate of exchanges, the faid payments thall be made in the money of the faid United States, reckoning four dollars and forty-four cents, to be equal to one pound fter-

II. Whereas it is agreed by the 4th Article of the Definitive Treaty of Peace, concluded at Paris on the 3d day of Seprember, 1783, between His Britannic Majesty and the United States; that creditors on either fide should meet with no lawful impediment to the recovery of the full value in stelling money of all bona fide debts thereto-fore contracted, it is hereby declared, that the said 4th Article, so far as respects its suture operation, is hereby recognized, confirmed, and declared to be binding and obligatory on His Britannic Majesty and the said United States, and the same shall be accordingly observed with punctuality and good faith, and so as that the said creditors shall hereafter meet with no lawful impediment to the recovery of the full value in ster-

ling money of their bona fide debts. III. It is furthermore agreed and concluded, that the Commissioners appointed in pursuance of the feventh article of the faid Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation, and whose proceedings have been suspended as aforefaid, shall, immediately after the lignature of this Convention, re-affemble and proceed in the execution of their duties, according to the provisions of the faid fe. venth article, except only, that instead of the fums awarded by the faid Commissioners being made payable at the time or times by them appointed, all fums of money by them awarded to be paid to American or British claimants, according to the provisions of the faid feventh ar-ticle, shall be made payable in three equal in-stalments, the first whereof to be paid at the expiration of one year, the fecond at the expiration of two years, and the third and last at the expiration of three years next after the exchange of the Ratifications of this Convention.
