which he removes, all original Instruments &c. passed by him in the district during his residence.

Insinuations for the District from which he shall remove, all the Original Instruments passed before him during his residence in such District, together with the Register which he shall have kept of the said Instruments by him passed during his residence in the District from which he shall remove.

Notaries entitled to certain Emoluments arising from Copies of such instruments so by them deposited. XIII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that every Notary who shall so have deposited his original Instruments, shall be entitled, during his life time, to an exact moiety of the emoluments which the Clerks shall receive as the price of the Copies which they shall have to deliver of the Original Instruments of such Notary.

Widows of Notaries also entitled to certain emoluments arising from such instruments &c. XIV. Provided always, and be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that after the death of such Notary, his Widow or Heirs shall have the same rights, with respect to the emoluments on Copies of the original Instruments so deposited in their life-time, as with respect to those which are deposited after the death of the Notaries, according to the fifth Section of an ordinance passed in the twenty-fifth year of the Reign of his late Majesty, George the Third, Chap.
