

Weekly Review of Montreal Markets.

CHURCH OBSERVER OFFICE, Tuesday, Jan. 26, 1869. The weather during the past week has been rather cold with occasional falls of snow. The wholesale department of trade continues without much activity. Preparations are being made, however, for the spring trade, and in boots and shoes there has been some briskness, goods in season going off rapidly. Hardware is also covering, but orders are of a general character. Dry goods and groceries are rather quiet.
