A former St. John man in the purchase of Eugene Field's original manuscript of Little Boy Blue, according to a dispatch from Chicago, dated Monday. It says: "A bid of \$1,000 dollars was made to-day for the original manuscript of Eugene Field's poem, Little Boy Blue, which was contributed to the allied bazaar by Simon Thompson, an intimate friend of the poet. The bid was received from David R. Forgan, president of the National City Bank. The bazaar was for the benefit of the wounded of the Entente Allies." Mr. Forgan, it will be remembered, was a bank manager in St. John some years ago and was also active in Fredericton in the same capacity. He is a Scotchman by birth but came to this country early in life. He is well known among provincial banking men of some years standing. He went to Chicago, several years ago and made good in banking circles in the Windy City. He has a summer home at St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, and visits the scenes of his former labors nearly every year. --St. John Telegraph.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY COUNCIL

The annual meeting of the Charlotte County Municipal Council convened here in the Court House on Tuesday, January 16, with Warden A. B. Hawkins, of Penfield, in the chair. The Council members present included J. D. Grimmer, Robert O'Brien, Parish of St. Andrews; J. C. McLeod, A. B. Gettem, Parish of St. James; Hermet Morrell, Chauncy R. Pollard, Parish of St. David; H. Acheson, Jas. McMillan, Parish of St. Patrick; Samuel McFarlane, W. B. Simpson, Parish of St. Croix; Geo. McVicar, W. H. Strickwell, Parish of St. George; A. B. Hawkins, Embury Paul, Parish of Penfield; J. A. Grant, James Marryat, W. D. Babcock, Parish of St. Stephen; E. W. Donald, F. P. Hunter, Parish of Dufferin; W. G. Mathewson, Chas. Giles, Parish of Lepreau; F. W. Richardson, E. A. McNeill, Parish of West Isles; J. W. Matthews, Alex. Calder, Jr., Parish of Campbell; Irving Ingalls, H. Ingersoll, Parish of Grand Manan; M. McCann, H. Emmes, Parish of St. James; David Johnson, town of St. Stephen; E. A. Greason, town of St. George; H. McAllister, town of Milltown; G. Douglas, town of St. Andrew.

The Oath of Allegiance was administered to the representatives of the four towns of the County, and to Councillors, Chauncy R. Pollard and Robert O'Brien, who have been elected since the last meeting. Owing to the lateness of the train which conveyed the Warden and a large number of the Councillors, the chair was not taken till 3.45 in the afternoon.

Warden Hawkins in his opening address to the board said, that he was glad to note the large attendance of the Councillors. He also stated that the prosperity of the County had probably never been exceeded. Last year the fishermen had experienced a banner year, and although the catch in some parts had been light, the high prices prevailing had made up for it. The farmers had also had a good year, but he was sorry to note that Messrs. Connors Bros. were unable to get for their cattle which they required in for their meat canning plant at Black's Harbor. As Charlotte was a county well adapted for it, he hoped the farmers would go in for the raising of beef more extensively.

He had been appointed a delegate to attend the meeting of the Union of N. B. Municipalities, held at St. Stephen, last summer, but was unable to attend owing to it being his busy season. He understood, however, that the meeting had been a profitable one.

Before taking his seat Warden Hawkins asked the Councillors for the same co-operation which they had given him last year, in all matters that would come before them. H. M. Webber was the appointed official reporter.

On motion the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with, and they were accepted as written.

Councillor J. A. Grant was appointed to the printing committee to replace F. Parker Grimmer, who is not a Councillor this year, otherwise the standing committees are the same as last year, as follows: Finance, the whole County Council; Hunter, chairman; Appointment and Assessment, McNeill, Mathewson and Morrell; County property, Grimmer, Matthews, McMillan, Printing, Marryat, Grant, McLeod.

On Wednesday morning a communication was received from the local Women's Canadian Club, inviting the Council to attend their meeting in Paul's Hall on Thursday evening. The Warden also read a communication from the Executive of the County Council, asking for equal opportunity with the St. Croix Courier to tender for the printing and distributing of the County Accounts for last year and the report of the meeting of the Council now in session. This was taken up later and on motion of Councillor McMillan, seconded by Councillor McNeill, the printing committee were instructed to call for tenders for the County printing, the lowest and most satisfactory tender to be accepted.

The special patriotic tax for Charlotte amounting to about \$11,500.00 levied by the local government for the patriotic fund received some discussion on Wednesday afternoon, as to how it would be raised.

Councillor Hunter's motion that a \$2.00 poll tax be levied on all males within the County, exclusive of the towns, between the ages of 21 to 60 carried after an amendment thereto was lost.

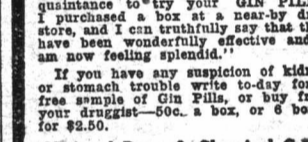
