BRITISH SHELLED GERMANS

Submarine Operations at Zeebrugge Received a Smash. Fleet Poured Hot Metal Into Works of the Enemy.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Nov. 25.—The destruction of Germany's rudimentary naval base at Zeebrugge by shell fire from British and French warships, together with Germany's grim preparations for her renewed attempts to crush a way through the allied line to the French coast, were the most significant features in the news coming to hand to-day from the western arena of the war.

FRENCH WAR OFFICE GIVES OUT SUMMARY TELLING OF RECENT HEAVY FIGHTING

Germans Under-rate the Strength of the Allies—One Feature of Success—Splendid Work is Being Done by the French Army.

[By Special Wire to The Courier] PARIS, Nov. 24, 1:10 p. m.—The Bulletin Des Armees, in its issue of November 25, will publish a summary of the military operations of the last six weeks. This article was given out officially for publication in Paris yesterday afternoon, and it is as follows:

OFFICIAL FRENCH NOTICE

[By Special Wire to The Courier] PARIS, Nov. 25.—The official statement given out by the French war office this afternoon says: "From the North Sea to the Ypres there has been no infantry attacks. Between Langemark and Zonnebeke we have gained territory. In the vicinity of La Bassée, the Indian troops recaptured from the enemy certain trenches which had been taken from them the evening before. From La Bassée to Soissons there has been an almost complete calm. We have made slight progress near Berry-Au-Bac and in the Argonne."

AN IMPROVED PASSENGER SERVICE IS SOUGHT BY THE BRANTFORD BOARD OF TRADE

Brantford Connection on Grand Trunk to the North is Discussed—Various Other Matters Taken Up at Meeting Last Night.

The Board of Trade met in conclave at the City Hall last night when the principal item under discussion was the proposed changes of the Grand Trunk Railway service. It was felt that if the Company carried into effect some of their proposals, Brantford would be placed at a serious disadvantage from a freight shippers point of view, and also from a commercial point of view inasmuch as freight would be delayed greatly, while commercial travellers from other centres would be able to get on to the ground five hours before his Brantford competitor.

Civic Officials Rather Upset Over Situation

"Bosh, all Bosh," was the term of one city official this morning when the policy of retrenchment adopted by the City Fathers was mentioned to him. "They will be cutting off somebody's head, and then they will know what they are about," he went on to say. "However," he continued "time will tell and we shall see."

WHAT CHANGES ARE BEING MADE BY GRAND TRUNK FROM THE CITY

The main line service upon the Grand Trunk Railway to Brantford remains unaffected, declared Mr. T. J. Nelson when questioned upon the proposed changes in the time table for the least. The service which was altered however was that giving connection with all centres north of Palmerston. A number of minor changes are to be cancelled and changed, and as a result, Brantford will not be able to make the 12 o'clock connection at Palmerston for such places as Kincardine and Owen Sound and points north. This means that freight and travellers from Brantford have not an equal chance with Toronto and Hamilton. The Ambitious City can get into this territory through Georgetown as of old, and the Queen City can get on the ground through Guelph, while Brantford cannot connect at all, thus her traders and travellers would only arrive on the field to find it had been covered. This Work Too Terrible Almost to Contemplate

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Nov. 25.—10:25 a.m. The French Steamer Admiral Gantheaume, which was sunk October 26, how on her way from Calais to Havre, with a great throng of refugees aboard, was the very aim of a German torpedo, according to an admiralty statement issued to-day. An examination, it is stated, revealed a fragment of the torpedo in a lifeboat. Though crowded with 2,000 refugees, many of whom were women and children, only forty lives were lost, the others being rescued.
