### A BIG ARMY.

The Americans have already a powerful army, and a tried army, and a victorious army in France, equal to the best troops in the field, and growing every day, and there will be no break in the increase in that army until America will have an army not far short, if at all, of the German Army itself.

Over 825,000 Americans were sent overseas during May, June, and July. Men are moving to the training camps in this country at a corresponding rate.

By Aug. 11, 300,000 had gone overseas. During August, 300,000 will go into training as fast as there is room for them. And if Congress only does its part promptly by extending the draft-age limits, according to the war Departments' plans, "there will be no break in the increase in the army," a broad or home, until victory is assured.
