BRITAIN AND RUSSIA

Serious Irritation Between the Old Antagonists.

The British Cabinet has just summoned on Saturday—Russia Adopts a Tone That is Considered to be Nothing Short of Threatening—Greece Shows a Disposition to Intervene.

New York, Feb. 28.—Mr. H. R. Chamberlain cables from London to The Sun: The Greek Cretan situation is, in its larger aspect, less hopeful. The announcement of an agreement of the powers for its final settlement was hailed with interest. There exists at the present moment serious irritation between Russia and Great Britain, which has provoked the former power to adopt an attitude that is regarded by the latter as a serious term that threatens. I do not pretend to know the exact cause of the irritation, but it is believed that a meeting of the British Cabinet this afternoon will be held to discuss it. It is impossible to say. Singular semi-official communications from St. Petersburg are published daily, in which it is set forth: "In the day of Greece, with blind misapprehension of her own advantage, offering further opposition to the well-meaning advice of Russia and of the powers in alliance with her, or creating difficulties, or in the event of her allowing herself to be entangled in her present attitude by self-seeking friends, perhaps on the supposition of a lack of unanimity among the great powers, because one or another power did not support at the outset the proposals of Russia, which is in perfect agreement with Russia in regard to the Russian, in such an emergency, is determined upon her course of action, and she has accordingly published her acceptance of Russia's proposal for solving the difficulty.

Ontario Parliament. A condensed summary of the Proceedings of the Past Week.

Toronto, Feb. 22.—At 10:45 a session of the Attorney-General introduced an act to make better provision for the keeping and auditing of municipal and school board accounts. The act authorizes the Lieutenant-Governor to appoint an officer to be known as the "Provincial Municipal Auditor," and

confers power upon that officer to frame rules, with the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor, to regulate the form of books of account to be kept by treasurers, the system of book-keeping to be adopted, the manner in which securities and moneys of municipalities and school boards are to be kept, and the auditing and disbursement of the same; that the auditor shall prepare books for use by the various classes of municipalities, except cities, and when approved by the Lieutenant-Governor, these books are to be procured and used in these municipalities. The auditor may also, if directed by the Lieutenant-Governor, inspect the books of account for other bills read a first time were:

Toronto, Feb. 28.—Richard Harcourt brought down his long-expected bill amending the Liquor License Act. As was generally expected, he gives the temperance people a little bit of the half dollar. The Provincial Treasurer explained, was one effecting the abolition of the license. The amendment according to population is to be one license for each 250 of population. The age of a minor is extended from 18 to 21 years of either sex. Provision is now made that municipalities under Local Option by-law shall contribute their share of the cost of enforcing the law. No license fees are to be issued after the 1st day of April, 1899. One-half of the existing saloons are to be put out of business in 1899, and the balance in 1900.
