London, Wednesday, Nov. 22, 5 a. m. - It is announced from Durban that communication with Es court is interrupted, which seems to confirm the belief that a Boer commando has established itself at Willow Grange or near the Mooi River, and have cut the telegraph wires. 

President Kruger Administers a Snub to Uncle Sam.

Declines to Allow the American Consul to Transmit Further Information.

London, November 22 .- Callers at the United States embassy yesterday were nformed that the United States was no longer able to forward messages of secure information regarding the Brit ish prisoners, President Kruger having refused the request to permit Consul

refused the request to permit Consul Macrum to transmit a list of British prisoners. Though Mr. Macrum apparently still remains the nominal agent of Great Britain, he is practically deprived of all powers pertaining to the position.

It is understood that President Kruger objected to Mr. Macrum on the grounds that the United States claims to neutrality were prejudiced by her evident friendship for Great Britain.

All communications to British prisoners now go through the military channels, which render their ultimate delivery doubtful, and certainly slow. The British government so far has not taken any steps to ameliorate the present condition of the prisoners. A government official informed a representation of the Associated Press that he ent condition of the prisoners. A gov-ernment official informed a represent-ative of the Associated Press that he did not see any good in trying to get any other power to act in their behalf, as President Kruger would doubtless as President Kruger would doubtless treat its representatives in the same manner that he had treated the representative of the United States. Moreover, the official added, "it is not likely that President Kruger will be there long. If we did ask any other power to act in behalf of Great Britain it would possibly be Portugal."

# MAFEKING'S LOSS.

The Boers' Guns Continue to Pour in Shells at Long Range.

London, Wednesday, Nov. 22.—Late last evening the War Office made public two despatches from Gen. Buller at Cape town. The first had been received from Gen. Clery, dated Monday, Nov. 20, and announced that three privates were wounded the previous day, Nov. 20, and announced that three privates were wounded the previous day at Mooi River. The second was from Col. Baden-Powell, dated at Mafeking, Nov. 6th, saying,—"All well here. We have had a few successful sorties. Our loss is two officers and seventeen men killed and four officers and 29 wounded. The enemy's loss is heavy. His numbers are decreasing. heavy. His numbers are decreasing, but his guns remain and shell us, keeping out of reach of our small guns. Have had no news from the outside since Oct. 20."

"An efficial communication from Lady emith, dated Nov. 18, says the garrison is maintaining its position. A Boer force is reported to the rear of Boston, a day's ride from here."

There is a growing belief here that we will move toward Ladyemith at the end of this week."
