Boer Relief Forces From Ladysmith Defeated-700 Prisoners Taken.

New York, Feb. 23. - A London deepatch says: - It is reported that reinforcements for Gen. Cronje have been repulsed by Gen. Roberts at Paardeberg. Gen. French has cap tured over 500 prisoners from Gen. Cronje's camp and 200 other prisoners have arrived at Cape Town. ANOTHER BOER REPULSE.

Paardeberg, via Modder River, Feb. 25.—Evening - The Scottish Borderers and the Yorkshires, have repulsed a Boer attack, inflicting heavy

One thousand coers, commanded by Gen Dewet, who were known to be operating in the immediate front, at early dawn yesterday determined to attempt to break through the British lines and aid Gen. Cropje.

Daniel Golden, of Ottawa, was suf-focated by smoke from a small fire in his dwelling. Negotiations, it is said, are in pro-gress for the formation of a paval reserve in Canada.

The Masonic Temple, destroyed by fire at London, Ont., will be replaced by a larger and better building.

The Government has extended the time for private sale of binder twine at Kingston Penitentiary to March 20. A body of 500 Boers moved toward the British left and cantered in the direction of a kopje with the object of occupying it.
