#### INSURGENT'S SUCCESSES.

Port of Spain, Trinidad, March 18 .-A force of Venezuelan insurgents, supported by the revolutionary steamer Bolivar, captured the town of Juan Griego, on the Island of Margarita, yesterday morning, and afterwards moved on the town of Asuncion, capital of the island, which forms the State of Neuva Esparta. The Venezuelan government troops were de-feated, and there was every indication that the insurgents would soon be masters of the whole island.

Prince Met by Kaiser at Cuxhaven While Crowds Cheered--Boarded Warship.

Brunshuttel, Prussia, March 18. The battleship Kaiser Wilhelm II, arrived here at 8.45 and tied up for the night. She will proceed to Kiel to-

morrow. Cuxhaven, March 18 .- The return of Admiral Prince Henry of Prussia to Germany's soil was safely accomplished to-day amid the pomp and circumstances with which the Prince's imperial brother has seen fit to mark the successful ending of Prince Henry's American mission

The Hamburg-American line steam er Deutschland, from Cherbourg, hav ing on board the Prince and his suit was first sighted at 5.30 this afternoon. The German battleship Kaise Wilhelm II. steamed down the road stead to meet the Deutschland, returned escorting the big liner. Emperor William stood upon the quay surrounded by high naval and munici pal officials. Commander William H. Beehler, the naval attache to the American embassy, stood at the em-

peror's side. The thousands of spectators cheered wildly, as Prince Henry walked down the gangway from the steamer. Emperor William kissed his brother upon both cheeks and shook hands with the members of the suite. In the meantime the guns of the squadron saluted.

Side by side his majestyl and Prince Henry then passed down in front of the marine guard, which stood at the salute. After this the marine guard passed in review. The passengers on the Deutschland crowded to the steamer's rail and cheered heartily during the ceremony. Emperor William and his party, Prince Henry and his staff and Commander Beehler then boarded a tender and proceeded to the bat-tleship Kaiser Wilhelm II. The Kaiser

#### AN EXAMPLE

Citizen Says the Hustling Town of Dresden is an Object Lesson for Chatham.

"Property is booming in Dresden just now," said a Maple City man who returned last evening from the Beet Sugar Town. "In fact, Dresden is having one of the biggest booms it has had in 25 years. It is simply something immense. Property which you could buy last year for \$100 and then be paying a high price for it, is now being sold for \$400.

"I think, though, the people there are getting a little too wild over it and carry their enthusiasm to excess. You must understand that the beet sugar factory will run for only onethird of the year, and while it is closed up matters will be at a standstill. This will cause a reaction and the people will not be expecting it. There is no doubt that the factory will be a big help to the city, but the farmers will be the people who

will reap the most of the benefit.
"Their canning factory is going head, too, and will help the town along to a certain extent. "It seems very queer to me, those capitalists would go past Chat-

ham and go to a place as small as Dresden to establish a plant worth \$600,000, simply because they were given a bonus of \$40,000. In my opinion, when they were expending so much money they should have gone to a larger place, where they would They will soon lose that much in reight from Dresden to Chatham.

"These being facts, Chatham should get its eyes opened and secure more factories."
