withdrawn.ROYAL VISIT
TO LONDONLondon, Oct. 19.—The plans for
the State progress of King Edward
and Queen Alexandra on Saturday,
October 25th, have been definitely set-
tled. The Royal procession will go
at a walking pace through the fol-
lowing thoroughfares—The Mall, Marlborough Gate, Pall
Mall, the north side of Trafalgar
Square, the Strand, Fleet Street,
Lodgerie Hill, St. Paul's churchyard,
Cannon street, Queen Victoria street,
the Mansion House, Princess Street,
Gresham street.After the luncheon at the Guildhall,
the royal journey to Buckingham
palace will be made via—King William street, London Bridge,
Borough High Street, Borough road,
St. George's Circus, Westminster
Bridge Road, Westminster Bridge,
Bridge street, Parliament Square,
Whitehall, the Horse Guards, the
Mall.It is not expected that the luncheon
at the Guildhall will be more than
half an hour long, but, as will be seen
from the route selected, the progress
through London will occupy a very
long time.Work has already been begun on
the street decorations. The usual
plan of employing Venetian artists is
to be dispensed with, and, instead, fes-
tivities will be carried from house to
house. In this way an absolutely new
effect in this city will be obtained,
and it will, it is expected, be much
more artistic than the usual hackneyed
decorations.The scene in the Great Hall, where
luncheon is to be served, will be a
splendid one. The stonework floors
will be covered by the crimson carpet.
Over the royal table there is to be a
magnificent canopy of crimson vel-
vet, and silk lined with cream-colored
satin. The display of gold plate will
be of exceptional interest. The cor-
poration is very rich in this respect,
and on occasions of Royal visits to the
city the livery companies add to the
splendor of the scene by lending some
of their own pieces. The gold smiths,
the drapers, the armorers, and the
braziers are all owners of very valu-
able examples, and for October 25th
they will send their choicest treasures,
especially in the form of cups, which
will be well shown off against the
dark wood paneling of the hall.

KING LEOPOLD III.

Fruit Jars

In the first part of the year we
bought very heavy in fruit cans, ex-
pecting, as everybody did, from all in-
dications, a very large yield of fruit
of all kinds, which certainly meant
low prices, and as sugar was very low
in price, we figured that there would
be an immense sale of fruit jars, but
it did not turn out so, small fruit
barely being half a crop, and in con-
sequence never got cheap, so that
there was not a large quantity put up.
We sold very few cans until the end of
the season when peaches came in, but
we always have found that when the
cans are not used in the earlier part
of the season, the sale is never as large.
Although we sold almost double the
quantity of cans that we sold other
years, we still have a good stock of
Crown quarts and Imperial quarts
that we are selling for 75c and 85c a
dozen.We were told on Saturday by sev-
eral people looking for jars, that they
had been told by other grocers that
there were no cans in town, which is a
mistake. We have a few dozen that
we will sell at 75c and 85c, a dozen.
Please don't ask us to give you a 5c
or 10c rebate, as we don't make
enough on our jars to give all our pro-
fit away.
