PARKER'S PHARMACY.

The reported purchase of the Midland Railway by the D. A. R. is contradicted. It is said that while the Midland is for sale and that several offers have been made for it none yet received is satisfactory to the directors.

A terrible explosion took place at Waverly, Halifax county, on Monday, when the drying house of the Acadia Powder Company was blown to atoms. A ton or so of gunpowder exploded, the cause of which is not apparent. The property loss is about \$20,000. There was no loss of life, though the concussion was tremendous.

Among the contributions to the Youth's Companion for December 29 is an article on "A New Insect Enemy"—the brown-tailed and the gypsy moth, which are working destruction in some parts of New England; an account of the training of a big alligator in the New York Zoological Park; a tale of adventure, "In an African Cavern," by David Slocum, and a startling warning by a physician of "The Dangers of Wood Alcohol."

The post office department has issued a circular explanatory of the new postal connection between Canada and Mexico, which takes effect on Jan. 1st, next. Mail matter, first, second and third classes, 7 letters, newspapers, samples of merchandise and printed and miscellaneous matter, may be sent to Mexico at the same rates as to Canadian points. Articles of merchandise which pass as fourth class matter in Canada, will have to be sent to Mexico by parcel post.

The funeral service of Rev. H. H. Roach was held at Clarence on the 25th inst. Pastors Daley and Kinlay were present to assist in the service. Mr. Roach was widely and favorably known and his death is sincerely lamented. Mrs. Roach is a daughter of the late Dennis Redden, of Black River. She will remain in St. John until spring, the Main Street church, of which Mr. Roach was pastor, giving her the use of the parsonage until that time, and rendering beside many acts of sympathy and kindness.

The Duke of Argyll has long been a regular yearly contributor to The Youth's Companion. For the issue of Dec. 29th he has written an interesting article on the powers and duties of the Governor-General of Canada. Having formerly held the appointment himself, the duke speaks with authority as to the influence which the viceregal is able to exert, if he is a man of tact and ability, in promoting the internal welfare of the Dominion and strengthening the attachment of the people to the mother country. A fine portrait of Earl Grey, the new Governor-General, illustrates the article.

St. John's church was simply but prettily and effectively decorated for the great festival of the Incarnation, last Sunday. There were two celebrations of the Holy Communion, at 8 a. m. and at 11 a. m., when a large number of the parishioners received. The singing at both the morning and evening services was excellent and reflects great credit upon all concerned: upon the organist, Mrs. Chas. Borden, who has so long and faithfully and so efficiently presided at the organ; upon the choir leader, Mr. Syron, who at considerable personal exertion has so carefully and painstakingly trained the choir, and upon the choir whose attendance at the practices and interest in the singing leaves nothing to be desired. The new organ, it is to be hoped, will soon be within sight. The church will also be shortly beautified by a new pulpit and oak lectern, the latter in memory of the late Mrs. Tremaine and her sister Miss Chipman. The construction of these articles of furniture has been entrusted to Mr. Geo. A. Pratt, whose well known artistic ability is a guarantee that they will give the highest satisfaction.

The mining committee of the Halifax Board of Trade are asking the Dominion government to send an expert from the Dominion geological survey to come to Nova Scotia and investigate the iron-ore deposits of the province. The mining men say that the two big steel companies have made such investigations on their own account and probably have the information, but it is not available for the public. They want the information both to protect, investigate and to encourage them.

The Collector of Customs, Mr. Bill, informs us that after January 1st, all importers will be required to produce duplicate invoices at the Customs office before the entry of goods will be permitted. These invoices will be required to show the "fair market value in the country of production," as well as the cost to the consumer or importer, and in no instance will he be permitted to relax this regulation of the department of Customs, and whenever such duplicate invoices are not produced, delivery of goods will not be granted until the above regulations are complied with.
