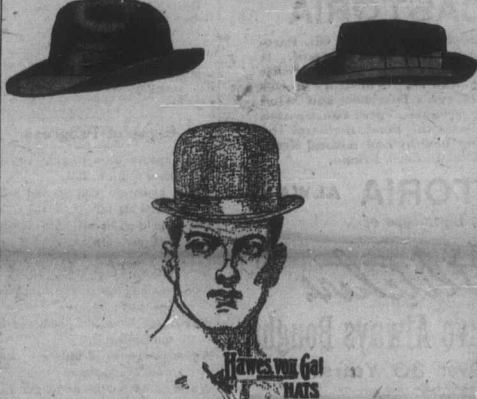

Mathematical.

THE ACADIAN has received the following solutions of the mathematical problem published in last issue:

28 Norton St., New Haven, Conn., Jan. 27th, '08.

Editor of the Acadia.

DEAR SIR:—Enclosed is a solution of the mathematical problem you published in your issue of Jan. 24th:

Let x equal number of lbs. of wool.

" y " " of yds. of cloth.

" z " " price per yd. that the merchant sold the cloth for.

Then by the condition of the trade,

.25 x equals 4y.

Or x equals 4y.

But the price of sale of the cloth minus its cost and minus the loss on the wool was equal to 20 per cent. of its cost.

Or 34 lbs. lost 34c. on the wool and since the original cost of the cloth was 50c. he made only 10c. per yard on the transaction, but he gained a profit of twenty per cent. for one cent is twenty per cent. of 50c. There is no limit to the amount of cloth sold.

Value received for 1 yd. of cloth equals 60c. Value received for 10 yds. of cloth equals 600c. Hence 4lbs. wool are equivalent in value to 1 yd. cloth. Customer is allowed \$1.00 for 4lbs. of wool, therefore he is charged \$1.00 per yd. for the cloth.

Militarism in the Schools.

An Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto News recently recounted, in a somewhat commendatory spirit, a plan which is being tried to introduce military drill in the public schools of the maritime provinces, beginning with Nova Scotia. The avowed object of this move is to improve the physical stamina of the people, and add to the military strength of the nation. Deeply interested in whatever affects the educational future of this country, The Farmer's Advocate desires to call attention to the far-reaching significance of this proposition, and of the suggestions which are made for giving it effect.

A survey of the situation in different provinces indicates that educational policies are at present passing through a transition stage, and it behooves every man and woman concerned for the future of the country to acquaint himself and herself as thoroughly as possible, before we are committed to the initial step, with the tendency of proposals like the one under review.

Those who are promoting the Nova Scotia experiment will no doubt want to see it extended to the other provinces of Canada.

As outlined by the correspondent of The News, the Nova Scotia arrangement takes the form of an agreement between the Dominion militia authorities and the provincial department of education, whereby drill will be included in the school curricula, and the militia department will provide the instructors, who will be competent, to enable teachers, in turn, to qualify themselves to impart such instruction.

In the second place, the inducement is held out of an annual bonus of from \$50 to \$100 to teachers who will (a) instruct the pupils, and (b) join the militia. Foreseeing difficulties likely to arise at this point, provision is made for the two classes of certificates ('A' and 'B'), the former for men, and meaning that they are capable of granting military instruction; the latter for women, who are presumed to be able to rise to the standard of being able to impart physical instruction and drill and teach the youth how to sit, stand erect, and move in order. But the militia department grants them no bonuses which are for the men in possession of the grade 'A' certificates, which they obtain by taking courses at military centers.

As a consideration favorable to the carrying out of the scheme, it is thought the bonus will be more inducement to the return of men to the teaching profession who, in Ontario and elsewhere, have drifted out because of low salaries.

In support of the propaganda, the case of Japan is cited, where children from six to ten are given physical and squad drill; from ten to twelve, company drill; from thirteen to eighteen, the case of arms, rifle exercises, and so on, as far as a preparation for efficiency in war. But Canada is not lying alongside a settled despotism like Russia, and these kindred Anglo-Saxon nations should proceed upon the peace and arbitration of peace, and not upon the theory of unappealable horrors and waste of a fratricidal war.

In North America, the surest way to bring on war is to prepare for it by raising the military spirit; the surest way to avoid war is to turn the people's thoughts and aims towards the arts and triumphs of peace.

The pretence is made that the objects of military drill in the public schools can be obtained without subtracting from the energy and working time of the people—an absurdity upon its face.

To this military propaganda among the youth of our land, we must enter our protest, for two reasons, one that the war spirit is wrong the other that it will divert the educational energies of our teachers.

Our school systems need reformation, but it is in the direction of the arts of peace, not in the arts of war—Framers' Advocate.

The following from the Danbury News of Danbury, Conn., gives further details of the death and burial of Dr. A. P. Smith, of New York, which was referred to by THE ACADIAN last week.

The burial of Dr. A. P. Smith, of New York, who died suddenly at his home in that city Monday, took place in Brookfield, his native town, this morning. Dr. Smith was a practicing physician in this city for a short time several years ago, and for a number of years practiced his profession in Sandy Hook, where he succeeded Dr. W. C. Wile.

His death was the result of heart failure, following a severe attack of pneumonia. He had nearly recovered from the pneumonia and was thought to be somewhat improved when the disease attacked his heart which was much weakened by the illness and he passed away suddenly and very unexpectedly.

The funeral took place this morning at his old home in Brookfield and the interment was in the Brookfield cemetery. Dr. Smith was an uncle of Will C. Smith, of this city.

Dr. H. B. Webster and Mr. W. E. Porter are candidates for the mayoralty of the town of Kentville. Mr. W. E. Porter, the retiring mayor, who has filled the position for two terms and has proved an ideal chief magistrate, declined to run an election for a third term.

Acadia Seminary Notes.

The Planoforte Recital which was postponed from last Friday evening will be given this evening in Alumni Hall. Those who were privileged to hear the recital last Friday evening were greatly delighted with the programme. The several numbers were well rendered and the addition of the Elocution and Vocal selections added greatly to the pleasure of the listeners. It is hoped a large audience of Wolfville friends and patrons of the school will be present this evening.

The number of resident pupils in the Seminary this term has reached a total of 109. Two or three more pupils are expected. The total number of resident pupils for the year will reach 112. Of these 69 are from Nova Scotia, 35 from New Brunswick, 3 from Prince Edward Island and 5 from elsewhere on the continent.

The correspondent of the Daily Herald says: "The Acadia Choral Club is doing good work under the direction of Professor Ringwald. The dates of the festival have been fixed for May 7 and 8."
