THE WARDEN OF CENTRAL.

Dr. Gilmour Spoke to the Fireside Club Last Night.

"Behind the Bars" was the subject of Citizens of Hamilton, interested in archaeology, to the number of over one hundred, assembled in the museum in the Public Library building, last evening, to hear a lecture on the Hittites by Dr. David George Hogarth, M. A., curator of the Ashmolean Museum of Oxford University, and one of the leading archaeologists of the day. The lecture, which was held under the auspices of the Hamilton branch of the Archaeological Institute of America, was intensely interesting, and was illustrated with numberous stereopticon views, including marvings.

The fact that many of the views were buttined through Dr. Hogarth's personal explorations in Asia Minor added to the interest of his lecture. It is subject was "Hittle Discoveries in Relation to Early Greek History." The race of Hitties, he showed in opening, lived fifteen hundred years before Christ, and exerted wide influence on the old world from 1500 to 1200 B. C.
