

would get involved in such a political, as that person does. I would also challenge Mr. Arsenault, or any other person, to point out any instance where I took a stand in favour of, or against, any question, that I finished from my duty, since my first offering as a candidate, to represent the people.

[The following Letter has been handed to us for publication, by the Hon. D. Montgomery.]

Your Excellency having thought fit to dissolve the House of Assembly, it is not my intention, longer, to continue a Member of your Excellency's Government, and I beg leave to tender to your Excellency's acceptance the resignation of my seat in the Executive Council. Having now been a Member of the House of Assembly for a period of 18 years, and during that time, having served in five parliaments, consistently, I trust it may not be considered presuming in me, to submit to your Excellency, freely, the reasons which have impelled me to this step. From appeals made to Her Majesty by the House of Assembly of this Colony in the Sessions of 1849, 1850, Her Majesty was pleased to accede to the policy of granting to its inhabitants Responsible or self Government, and your Excellency's assumption of the Government of this Colony, in the year 1851, was considered an appropriate time for carrying that system into effect; and in the month of April, of that year, a Bill for a permanent Civil List, having passed the Legislature, and other preliminary arrangements having been completed, Responsible or self Government was then introduced, and a new Executive Council was formed, in accordance therewith. I was one of the majority who in 1850 voted for the introduction of the system of Responsible or self Government, and although I was by no means a supporter of those Members of the House of Assembly who were first called on to assist your Excellency in carrying it into effect, I was led to expect, that under your Excellency's administration, Responsible Government would have been carried out in good faith; and at that time, I believe your Excellency frequently declared that it was your intention to do so, and that whatever change might be produced in the persons composing the majority of the Representatives of the people, you would feel it your duty, to unite cordially with them, and administer the Government with equal justice and consideration towards them, that had been observed towards any other party who may have previously formed your Government. On the 9th February last, the new House of Assembly, the first one returned under your Excellency's administration, was called together, and, in a few days afterwards, that House declared by its vote, a want of confidence in your Excellency's advisers. A new Government was formed thereupon, of which I had the honor to become a member throughout the Session, which has lately terminated. The present Government was supported on every public measure, by a strong, and I do not hesitate to add, a highly respectable and intelligent majority in the Assembly; and I believe that, since their appointment to office, the Members of your present administration have in all their communications evinced the utmost courtesy and respect towards your Excellency, as well as their readiness to co-operate with you faithfully, in all matters in which the public interest and prosperity of the country were concerned. I extremely regret, however, that I now feel myself compelled to state to your Excellency, that it appears to me quite manifest, that the policy pursued by your Excellency towards the Members of your Government, has been of a very opposite nature to that which I conceive they had a right to expect. And a conviction is now forced upon my mind, that your Excellency instead of extending to them your countenance, and that constitutional support to which they were entitled, has allied yourself to a particular party to govern for their interests rather than for the welfare of the people at large. Against the unanimous opinion of your Council, your Excellency has determined to dissolve the House of Assembly, and that you have done so by the advice and unconstitutional interference of persons immediately interested in obtaining for themselves, the principal offices of Emolument, in the gift of the Government, is a fact, which has now become too clearly revealed to admit of the slightest doubt. These persons, most of whom were Members of your Excellency's late Government, were in constant intercourse with your Excellency during the whole of the late Session of the Legislature, and it is a matter of Public Notoriety that they originated a Petition for a dissolution of the House of Assembly, and that the Emisseries employed by them, in order to procure Signatures in the country districts, industriously circulated reports that you had expressed a desire for a change in the Government, and that if Petitions were numerously signed, you would endeavor to effect such change by dissolving the House of Assembly. Having perused the communication of my Colleagues, dated the 16th May instant, in answer to your Excellency's Letter addressed to us on the 6th instant, I fully subscribe to all that is therein stated; and I must express my deep regret, that your Excellency should be induced to adopt a course which I conceive totally unwarranted by any public expediency at the present time, while its consequences must prove so highly inconvenient to the great mass of the population, if not dangerous to the public peace of the Colony. Inconvenient because on account of this unusually late spring, the Agriculturists will be for a considerable time yet engaged in putting their Crops into the ground; and dangerous because in some of the country Districts, the people have been worked up to a state of excitement which may lead to serious collisions at the harvest.
