Mackdonald's Lucky Chance. What would be the result in Canada if Sir John had delayed the holding of the general elections till Parliament expired by effluxion of time? It is safe to say the low price of wheat has fully convinced the farmers that the N. P. can not add to their receipts, and the recent attack on Provincial rights—in Ontario in the Crooks Act and the River and Streams Bill, and in Manitoba in the disallowance of Railway charters—combined with the gross injustice of the Dominion Government in the matter of the Boundary award, have combined to create a revulsion of feeling that would sweep the Tories of Canada as effectually as that office has been performed for the Republican party of the United States.
