Census Returns.

THE CLAIMS OF THE WEST.

We notice from the Census Returns that Twillingate, St. John's West, St. John's East, St. George's and St. Barbe are the only districts which show gains by immigration. Twillingate shows 540; St. John's West, 76; St. John's East, 1,171; St. George's, 377 and St. Barbe, 568. The greatest percentage of actual increase from all sources are as follows: St. George's, 30.3; St. Barbe, 28.8; St. John's East, 16.9; Twillingate, 16.7; Fortune Bay, 14.0; Barin, 11.7; St. John's West, 11.3; and Bonavista, 11.3. The curious shifting of the population from district to district and the different rates of natural increase in the districts make the discrepancies in electoral representation more and more evident. One-sixth of the population of the island is now in the Western Districts of Fortune Bay, Burgeo & La Poile, St. George's and St. Barbe, and yet they have only one-ninth of the representation of the island in the House of Assembly. The time is ripe to give the West Coast the electoral representation which is its due.

Banker Arrives With 1200 Qtls.

The banking schooner Lucy, House, has arrived at the home port from the Grand Banks loaded with codfish. The following message was received today by the Marine and Fisheries Department from Harbor Breton: "John Smith's new schooner, Lucy, A. House, master, arrived from the Grand Banks yesterday filled to the hatches. Her captain reported for 1200 quintals and found cod plentiful." This is the second trip of the vessel from the Banks. On her last voyage she landed 800 qtls.

Train Held Up.

NEW ORLEANS, May 15. — Two masked men held up the New Orleans, New York Limited train No. 2 North bound, on the New Orleans and North Eastern railroad, eight miles South of Hattiesburg, Miss., shortly after midnight this morning, and after dynamiting the safe, in the express car, containing \$160,000. The passengers were not molested and no one was hurt. The train proceeded to Hattiesburg, where the city and county officials were notified. Poses formed and mounted on horses, started in pursuit of the robbers, who, it is said, took a Northeasterly direction, evidently heading for the Alabama State line.

FIVE CHARGES.

Five charges of dynamite were exploded in the express car, nearly demolishing it. A through safe, destined from New Orleans to Eastern Points, said to contain possibly \$150,000, most of which was Government funds, was blown open and the contents taken.

The train had stopped at Waterlake, just north of Richburg, when the men boarded the express car. At the time nearly all the passengers, except a few who were to leave the train at Hattiesburg, were asleep in their berths. The men first forced the engineer and fireman to leave the engine and together with Conductor Fleming and other members of the train crew, they were lined up against the train and covered with a revolver by one of the robbers, while the other entered the express car and forced the express messengers and a guard, said to be watching the Government money on the train, to get out and join the line. The messenger and guard were relieved of their weapons before they had a chance to make any resistance. After the guards and messenger had disembarked, the robbers, guarding the crew sent one of them back through the coaches with instructions to inform the passengers the train was being held for a certain purpose, and they were safe as long as they remained inside the cars.

Here and There.

BRAZILIAN MARKET.—The Brazilian Consul reported to-day, forty one shillings per drum with a tendency upwards.

POLICE COURT.—Three drunks who were conveyed to the Station in cabs, were released upon payment of cab hire. One drunk was fined \$1 or 3 days and another was discharged to take the pledge. In an assault case the defendant was fined \$1 or 3 days.

Four owners of unlicensed dogs were before the Court, two were settled, the remaining two were fined \$4 and 2 respectively. A charge of larceny against a domestic servant of Spaniard's Bay, was postponed to obtain further evidence. She is charged with stealing a brooch valued at \$6.

Sad Fatality.

Father and Son Swept Overboard—Son Loses His Life—Father Has Narrow Escape.

The schr. J. E. Greening, Capt. Rd. Fry, arrived this forenoon from Indian Arm, Bonavista Bay. The crew of the vessel report a sad drowning accident this morning.

The vessel was running pretty well in a free wind after leaving Catalina where she harboured, when Skipper Rd. Fry and his son, Thomas, who held the deck and were aft were suddenly hurled overboard by the jolting of the boom. The accident occurred off Green Island as the vessel ran along in a gale of wind. When Mr. Fry went overboard he managed to cling to the "downhaul," and yelling for help was rescued by other members of the crew. Thomas disappeared completely and it is believed the boom hit him and killed him before he struck the water. He was a fine young man only 21 years old, and today his heart broken father telegraphed the news of the drowning of his son to his mother. Quite a lot of schooners got in last night and the accident cast a gloom over all their crews.

Discussing an Increase.

A meeting of the Barbers' Union was held in the O'Connell Club rooms last night when the question of increased wages was further discussed. Rules for the government of the union were adopted. The union have engaged as legal adviser, Mr. M. P. Gibbs, who will ask the employers to accede to the Union's demand for more pay.

The "goats" as referred to in the Daily News this morning, made their escape before the steamer sailed.

Mail Robbery on Glencoe.

When the Glencoe reached Placentia on Tuesday night, Mail Officer Dunphy reported that on going to the safe in the mail room, when the ship was about 16 miles from Placentia, he discovered that some registered letters were missing. He made the discovery at this time as he went to the safe to check the registered letters. When the Glencoe left Burin there were 45 letters in the bundle and when he took them out of the safe to check them he found nine had been abstracted from the middle of the bundle. On the arrival of the steamer at Placentia, Sergeant Kent made an examination of the effects of the crew and officials, but nothing was found which afforded any clue to the mystery. For it is a mystery as the mail-room itself is under lock and key and no one but postal officials have a right to be there, and the safe is, the Postmaster General tells us, a good one. Postmaster Dunphy immediately advised the postal authorities, who instructed him to proceed with the ship to Port aux Basques, and a special officer would be despatched also. The case has been placed in the hands of the Inspector General who despatched an officer this morning to Placentia who will make a thorough investigation. It would appear that the thief made a selection and doubtless looked out for registered letters containing cash or other negotiable.

The incoming express left Port Blandford at 8.57 a.m. to-day. She is due here at 5.30 p.m.
