

Coddling the Huns.

We really are an amazing people. Or rather officialdom acts from time to time and in our name with a fatuousness that makes us seem more amazing than in fact we are. A letter in a recent issue of the "Times" very neatly illustrates this characteristic. A lady writes a British officer as complaining that he and several brother officers on their way home from active service were turned out of a first-class carriage at Folkestone to make room for German prisoners. Such a thing makes the average

man's blood boil. He wishes German prisoners to be treated with decency, but he despises the official coddling of them that has been repeatedly brought to light; and the idea that they should be allowed comforts or privileges that are denied to British officers or the rank and file of the British fighting services simply nauseates him.

Who is responsible for these grotesque imbecilities? The United Kingdom is peopled by nearly fifty million exceedingly human men and women with sound and kindly instincts and a solid sense of justice. But there is a corner of the kingdom, the Whitehall corner, that seems to be inhabit-

ed by persons who are superior to all normal emotions, who have outlived any prejudice they ever had in favour of their own countrymen, and who display every now and then an inspired indifference to the atmosphere around them. So we get these fantastic discriminations that revolt no one so much as the ordinary man.—London Daily Mail.

Six Times Torpedoed.

Not Scared Yet. Six times torpedoed in three years has been the experience of a ship's fireman named Hunter. He was in the Lusitania when the Hun sank her. He makes light of his adventures. "I know a man named Henry belonging to North Shields," he said, "who has been torpedoed 19 times and he is not scared of the Huns yet. Nor am I. Shall I go to sea again? of course I shall. What else is there to do?" First Engineer Brown, of Glasgow, who was also torpedoed, said: "This makes the third time I've been torpedoed in a comparatively short while. The second occasion it happened in the Atlantic, nearly 300 miles from land and we were adrift in boats for three days. But I haven't got cold feet yet."—Daily Mail.

The Gloating Kaiser.

Amsterdam.—Some days ago the Kaiser visited Aix-la-Chapelle town hall, where the council was in session. Addressing the gathering, he said: "In the west I inspected half-devastated France. There alone one obtains a right impression of the awful conditions that have been spared to our Fatherland. If any man should ever grow faint-hearted he ought to go to the front and see the devastation. He would then bear with patience the hardships and horrors of war."

The offensive is going ahead well. Already 600,000 British have been put hors de combat and 1,600 guns have been captured. The French are obliged to help everywhere. Our opponents have had a bad time. They deserved nothing else. Our task in the west will be accomplished, but we must have patience. We cannot settle in one day armies of millions, yet we shall obtain our aim. A difficult task is before us. To deal with it we have efficient smiths. We are going ahead in the Crimea also. The first trains laden with foodstuffs have arrived in Berlin from Ukraine. At Sebastopol we have captured a big and richly laden merchant fleet. There we shall revive traffic to the Black Sea. The position is therefore good.—Reuter.
