## Latest From Trepassey.

Special to Evening Telegram.
TREPASSEY, This Afternoon.
The twenty-seven destroyers that have called here are now along the Trepassey-Azores leg at intervals of fifty miles. Five are stationed between here and Halifax and five between Azores and Lisbon at similar intervals. In addition there are five super-dreadnoughts from Lis-bon across the Bay of Biscay with five motherships, oil tankers and relief vessels. The five super-dreadnoughts are, Utah, Arkansas, Wyoming, Florida and Texas, each of 24,000 tons displacement.

The route of the fliers will be start from here an hour before sunset and fly to Azores a distance of 1,200 miles, landing at the city of Punta Delgado in early morning. There they will remain for the renainder of the day refuelling, starting the next morning for Lisbon, disance eight hundred miles. Refuelling there they will leave and skirt the coast to Cape Finistere the furthermost N.W. point on the Portuguese coast, on the last leg of the of wine. journey. All flying will be done durng the hours of daylight.


