## Col. Martin to Lecture.

In connection with the Salvation Army Annual Congress for 1920, Col. Martin, Territorial Commander, will deliver a lecture in the Methodist College Hall on Sunday afternoon, presided over by His Excellency the Governor, entitled "Impressions Gained in Germany During Nine Years of Salvation Army Officialship: the Causes of the War and Germany's Ruin." The lecture begins at 3 o'clock, and judging by the subject chosen, will be well worth hearing.

The number of tents this year will be the largest in the history of the Regatta. There will be over seventy.

If His Excellency the Governor arrives here in time, he will be with the people at the Regatta, and do all in his power to make the day a success.

The first race will start at 10 a.m. It will be the Amateur with four boats.

The final meeting of the Committee was held last night at the T. A. Armoury to receive reports. "All is well along the Potomac," was the summing up of the situation.

Nearly all the crews were on the Lake, having the final practice, last night.

There are three fishermen crews sure; two from Flatrock. It is yet possible that there will be four.

"Interest and enthusiasm are on the increase," says President Hiscock, and all that is required now is fine weather to have the record Regatta.

Several applied for space for tents but could not be accommodated. All the ground is covered except a narrow passage way between tents from the road to the Lakeside.

"The public," says Mr. Hiscock, "have been most generous in their donations."

The carriage and motor regulations, under the supervision of the police, are very perfect.

You will meet men whom you have not seen since this time last year if you go to the Regatta to-morrow. The question, "where have they been ever since," will never be answered.
