PEACE CELEBRATION IN  
AYLMER

By direction of Mayor Wright an-  
nouncement of the signing of the  
Peace terms will be made in Aylmer  
by the ringing of bells and a general  
telephone alarm. Two hours later  
a procession will form up on John  
street south, facing north, the head of  
the procession to be at the Town  
Hall.

The order of the procession will be  
as follows: Mayor and council, Vet-  
eran's Gray-Dort Special, Band, Vet-  
erans in uniform, Cadet Band, Cad-  
ets, Fire Department and apparatus,  
Ladies' Auxiliary, G. W. V. A.,  
Red Cross, Women's Institute, I.O.D.  
E. Travel Club, King's Daughters,  
Mothers' Union, (the above seven,  
in cars), Business Men, Clerks, Shoe  
Factory, Condenser, Foundry, Cann-  
ing Factory, private autos.

The route of the procession will be  
as follows: Talbot street west to Wel-  
lington street, south to Pine street,  
east to John street, north to Syden-  
ham street, east 4 blocks, north one  
block to Talbot street, west to John  
street, north to Maple street, west to  
Myrtle street, south to Talbot, east  
to Post Office, south to the park.  
Cadets will be used as markers and  
hold banners. Each society will fall  
in at its respective banner. Roy  
Thayer will marshal the parade.  
Cars will be decorated, bring out your  
flags.

At 8 o'clock p.m. a public Thank-  
sgiving service will be held in the  
Town Hall, to which every one is  
cordially invited. This will be fol-  
lowed by a mammoth Torchlight Pro-  
cession, and concluded with a dis-  
play of fireworks.

The celebration proceedings are to  
be under control of the Aylmer  
branch of the G.W.V.A., and citizens  
are warned to be in readiness for  
this big event at a moment's notice.
