—Scarlet fever still lingers in South London.
—Miss Lottie Tarrant, St. Thomas, is the guest of Mrs. Geo. Whigley, city.

—The South London street cars now run to the end of the Victoria bridge viaduct.
—Rev. W. J. Clark will be out of town to-day and to-morrow, attending at preparatory services at Thamesford.

—George F. Brickenden, who has been seriously ill, was yesterday able to come downstairs, and expects to recover now rapidly.

—There was a large congregational service in St. Peter's Cathedral yesterday afternoon. It was a special day of devotion in the church almanac.

A Skimmed Milk Suit.
In the suit between Westgate yesterday at Osgoode Hall, Aylesworth, Q. C. moved absolute a rule nisi to quash the summary conviction of the defendant by a justice of the peace for the county of Middlesex for supplying skimmed milk to a close factory on the grounds that no offence against the Dominion statute 52 Vic., ch. 43, is disclosed, because the milk was not supplied for the purpose of being manufactured, but for the purpose of being sold as such, and on other grounds. He asked for costs of the motion on the ground that the proceeding was substantially a civil proceeding, and not well founded in fact. D. S. Rogers, of the King Street Presbyterian Church, conducted the service at the house. The railway men carried the coffin from the house to the hearse, and Bros. Charles Doe, J. McCormick, Frank Robinson, J. A. Tane, E. A. Reid and Thomas Rowe, of the C. O. F., acted as pall-bearers at Woodland Cemetery, where the burial service was performed by both societies. Toronto House of Business. Eleven years ago he started the London edition of the Detroit Free Press, and his writings in that journal and in other journals and magazines have brought him well-merited favor among the English reading public. Messrs. Cloutier & Vignaud are bringing out in March a volume of stories by him, to be published simultaneously in London and New York, and he has now taken a further step forward in assuming equal editorial and proprietary interest with Jerome K. Jerome in the Hier, Mr. Barr is, by the way, still an owner of land on the Detroit River in Canada, and has many friends in the Dominion.—(London Canadian Gazette).

A Bad Runaway.
About 9 o'clock this morning a team of horses attached to Joseph Mitchell's butcher wagon became frightened in the Market Lane and started at a lively gallop eastward on Dundas street. At the corner of Richmond the driver was thrown out by the sharp curve taken northward. Miss Lou Pollard, of South London, was on the crossing at the time, and in a hurried attempt to arrive and backward out of the way, slipped and fell, the wheels passing over her foot. She was taken into a drug store, but was found to be unhurt beyond a bruised ankle. The team continued running on Richmond street and in front of John Mould's grocery store and the horses collided forcibly with one of the horses pulled by the driver. The poor brute was knocked down and lay on the roadside for a time, suffering greatly until chloroform was given to the animal. The driver was not hurt. The driver was a merciful act to put it out of the way. The other horse was unhurt. The driver was valued at \$200, having made a good record.

A Serious Collision.
The central fire brigade was called out about 9 o'clock this morning to extinguish a blaze at an oil shed near the C. P. R. roundhouse. The South London (No. 9) brigade came from the central hall and while waiting for the other to return, a second alarm was given from another box by someone else who had seen the blaze at the oil shed and did not know the firemen were on the spot. Number three brigade started off and in turning northward on Clarence street the horse carriage or the horses knocked over a 13-year-old boy named John Valen, who lives at 529 Talbot street. The front wheel passed over him but luckily the hind wheel slewed away. Dr. Graham was summoned and found the lad bleeding from a gash in the back of the head. He was cared for until the ambulance arrived and conveyed him to the hospital. The firemen were walking their horses westward near the corner when the alarm came and in wheeling around to turn northward did not see the boy. It was apparently an accident for which no one in particular was to be blamed. The boy had started to cross the street the moment the horses darted forward, hence the collision. According to late inquiries at the hospital the boy is doing well and the chances for his recovery are good.
