Messrs. Bland, Essery, Somerville and Others Testify-Opinions Differ.

The royal fees commission began its session in this city at 10 o'clock to-day in the council chamber of the City Hall. The commission sat in Stratford yesterday, will be at Chatham to-morrow and return to London on Saturday. The members of the commission who were present were: Hon. Chancellor Boyd, Hon. John Beverley Robinson (ex-Governor of Ontario), John I. Mason, of Hamilton, and Thos. Brooks, of Brantford, with Mr. James Flemming, inspector of flegal officers, acting as secretary. Mr. John I. Hobson, of Guelph, arrived from Ottawa at noon. Mr. Emer-Morris avenue, Elizabeth, N. Y., blowing son, Toronto, president of the Ontario Chartered Stenographers, took the evidence.

Mr. John Bland, president of the Board of Trade, was the first witness examined. Mr. Bland would rather have the appointment of the Provincial officers in the hands of municipalities than by the Government. He thought the Government would be glad of this; it would prohibit people from trying to get office all the time, and have a tendency to make purer governments. He would have registrars and sheriffs appointed by the municipal councils, and clerks of the county courts, surrogate officers, county attorneys, division court clerks, etc., appointed by judge or by a law society. License inspectors he would have elected by the people. He said that Government institutions should be carried on on the same basis as a business concern. Vacancies should be advertised to competition, and there should be no greater pay or shorter hours than in any imilar municipal office. A fixed salary

should be paid instead of fees. Chancellor Boyd-Would you take the same view with regard to offices made by the Dominion Government in the appointment of civil servants and postmasters? Mr. Bland - Certainly. They would then do more work, and the public would

be much better served. Mr. Boyd-Do you see any sufficient reasons for making a change in the present system? ystem? Mr. Bland-Well, there seems to me a

Conclusion of the Debate in Labor Hall-

Opinions For and Against. The single tax debate was concluded in Labor Hall last night. After Messrs. J. S. Johnston and H. B. Ashplant had spoken in favor of and against single tax respect-

ively, the discussion became general. Mr. James Laut had seen the effects of single tax in Manitoba and the Northwest. Since its adoption they had been prosperous and had withstood the financial shock. He had yet to find a man dissatisfied

with it. Dr. Gardiner deplored the present inequalities of the social condition. Single tax was good, but it did not go far enough. He advocated a wage minimum and maximum and an income tax to check exorbitant individual revenue. The old law of Moses, by which there was a reversal every seven years to the old state of affairs and a complete reform of abuses, was a good system. Ald. Parnell said no man could accumulate the fortune of a Vanderbilt or a Gould honestly. The latter cornered everything they could get hold of and made the people pay the more. Monopolies for the public service and necessity should be run by the people and for the people.

Mr. Green-For heaven's sake, don't let the Government run them. (Laughter.) Ald. Parnell-The people make the Gov-

Mr. J. A. Stevenson said the cause of the present evil was the unfair distribution of wealth, and he thought single tax was the best remedy yet discovered. Mr. Ashplant spoke of profit-sharing as the cure, but how were they going to enforce it? Single tax was more radical and reasonable. Land, water and air were the necessities of life, and it should not be in the power of any individual to say he owned them. The enormous increase of wealth in the land, by reason of the people, should go to the people.

Mr. James Johnson strongly favored single tax. The private ownership of the material upon which labor must be exercised gave capitalists the power to own labor, and the private ownership of labor was the effect of the preceding cause.

Mr. Joseph T. Marks asked how they would regulate the liquor traffic under single tax. To collect license fees would not be single tax.

Voice-Wipe the traffic out. Mr. John Hargreaves said there was more spent for liquor in Britain in a year than for all the houses and lands. He explained New Zealand's method of taxation. The Government owned all railways and monopolies. They forbade a man to hold more than 64 acres of first-class land, or 2,000 acres of second-class land. The more land a man owned the greater rate of taxation he paid, which forced him to keep within a certain limit. The Government rented land at from 4 to 5 per cent, and opened up any new territory by its own railroads.

Mr. John Johnston showed that under single tax the value of a place could be ascertained by capitalizing the rent value. Mr. Ashplant finished the debate, and contended that rent was nothing to a business

concern in comparison with its profits. A vote of thanks to Messrs. Johnston and Ashplant, seconded by Ald. Parnell. was heartily carried. An expression of opinion from the meeting was not asked, as the debate was merely for educational purposes and many had not made up their minds as to the relative merits of single tax and profit sharing. A PUZZLING PROBLEM.

What To Do With The Coxey Battalions. WASHINGTON, May 2 .- What to do with the Coxey army is the problem which now confronts the local authorities. Col. "The place in which they are encamped," said he, "is a regular pesthole. If they are allowed to remain there and sickness breaks out among them, as is more than likely, the result will be not only fatal to them but to the people of

Washington. It is a serious problem.' The commonweal army is now at its new camp on First street in southwest Washington. The ground is inclosed by a board fence and along the south and west sides a canvas wall has been stretched, forming an awning. Under this a lot of clean straw has been thrown and the majority of the men are sheltered.
