Why Times Are Dull and Work Scarce.

One of the speakers at the London meeting in favor of the high tax candidate last night pooh-poohed the idea that any notice should be taken of the Curran bridge scandal, which Mr. B. B. Osler, who recently refused to be the Tupper Minister of Justice, so strongly condemned in his arraignment of the men in power. This attempt to gloss over the robbery of the public for the benefit of political favorites ought to be marked by the electors of the country. It will be remembered that the contract for this bridge was let to Mr. St. Louis, a cousin of one of the Ministers at Ottawa. He was permitted to charge the taxpayers of Canada enormous prices for labor used by him, though he only gave the workers the lowest current remuneration for their services. Here are some of the charges made by this contracting member of the Ottawa Family Compact, and paid for, too, out of the hard-earned taxes of the workers of Canada:

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The General Elections.

Sir Oliver Mowat Addresses a Big Gathering in Berlin.

Hon. David Mills Makes an Important Declaration in Bothwell.

The Political Pot Keeps Boiling All Over.

CUSTOMERS MOST WANTED.

Guelph, June 12.—Addressing the great gathering held in honor of Mr. Laurier on Wednesday night, Mr. Geo. H. Bartram, the well-known Toronto manufacturer, said that it was as a plain business man attending to his business more than to the politics of the country that he came to discuss the trade question. Not as a political theorist, but as a practical man and a manufacturer, he discussed the subject, with the result that he presented a complete case in behalf of the revenue tariff policy of the Liberal party. He made an eloquent plea for freedom, justice and toleration for all classes in the country. He pointed out numerous anomalies in the tariff which have come under his personal observation as an importer of raw material. Amid great applause he declared that when the Government taxed the raw material of the men who were employing labor it was injuring the manufacturer. The trade policy advocated by Mr. Laurier, he said, would benefit the manufacturers more than the National Policy. "I believe," Mr. Bartram said, "that a moderate revenue tariff suited to the requirements of the country, will give, as a matter of fact, all the advantage that any Canadian manufacturer has at a right to expect in any shape or form." Mr. Bartram added that what was wanted in this country more than anything else was customers. He was loudly cheered when he had finished.

HON. DAVID MILLS' VIEWS.
Chatham, June 12.—Hon. David Mills held a very successful meeting in Chatham Center last night. He dealt at length with the tariff, and forcibly exposed the protection fallacies of the party in power. After going into the details of the tariff, he pointed out the Indian affairs and the system of superannuation. Mr. Mills closed with a few words on the Manitoba school question, which, he thought, had been given undue prominence. While admitting the right of the minority to a fulfillment of their demands, the Liberals hold that the question could never be settled in the high-handed manner adopted by the Government. The Liberals wanted to know the excitement to calm down, find out the exact nature of the grievance, and deal with it in a conciliatory manner. If Mr. Laurier was placed in power, the question would not be heard of in Federal politics again, as no coercion measures would be necessary. The question would be honorably and satisfactorily settled. In conclusion, Mr. Mills asked for a renewal of the support of the Liberal party for 25 years, and the applause followed indicated that at Chatham Center he would receive it. The meeting closed with cheers for the Queen, Mr. Laurier and Mr. Mills, and music by the band.

QUEBEC EAST.
The opening of Mr. Laurier's central committee was the occasion for an immense meeting of his friends of Quebec East. The opposition to his re-election is lauded by everyone. Over 5,000 people were present and the enthusiasm for the Liberal leader was unbounded.

A REPUDIATION.
Mr. Edson Fitch, the great match manufacturer at Etchemin, Levis, has authorized a repudiation of the statement of the Conservative organs that he is opposed to the re-election of Mr. Laurier, for Levis, and that he has accepted the position of honorary president of his opponent's committee.

SIR OLIVER AT BERLIN.
Berlin, June 12.—Sir Oliver Mowat and Hon. James Young addressed a great mass meeting of the electors here last night. In the course of his remarks on the Manitoba school question Sir Oliver said the highest court of the empire, and were prepared to take the law and the interpretation of the constitution from the Privy Council. When that court said there was a grievance, that grievance should be removed, they accepted the statement. The court, however, did not state how that grievance was to be removed, or the exact nature of the grievance. The question required the most careful consideration. There was a question between the Protestants and Catholics of Manitoba. It could be heated, but never by the coercion bill. That settlement could be brought about by conciliation, and it would be done in that way. (Cheers.)
