Mrs. Davis, of Toronto, Lectures to a Lendon Audience—A Plea for Healthy-Sized Waists and Short Skirts — Pre-vailing Customs Condemned.

At the regular meeting of the W. C. T. U. yesterday afternoon, the principal topic under consideration was "Hygienio Dress Reform."

This subject was ably handled by Dr. Lelia M. Davis, of Toronto, Provincial W. C. T. U. superintendent of hygiene and heredity. Dr. Davis is a pleasant speaker, and held the attention of her audience for over an hour while discoursing upon this subject, which is every day recoiving increased attention. reased attention.
She stated that in our method of clothing

over an hour while discoursing upon this subject, which is every day recoiving increased attention.

She stated that in our method of clothing curselves the underlying motive should be: First, health; second, convenience, and third, beauty. The first and greatest question to consider is health. To have this there must be perfect freedom of movement. By means of charts the illegest of tight lacing and heavy clothing were pointed out in a manner that made everyone present feel that whatever had been the case in the past there must be freedom in the future. Dr. Davis emphasized this particularly in regard to young girls who have not yet attained their growth; whose illness or death friends are apt to regard as a providential dispensation, when in reality it is often from the effect of improper clothing. Pictures of the fashions 50 years ago and also of the present prevailing styles were shown in comparison with the ideal human form. That which was a few years ago considered the propersyle now appears riduculous, and just so will the present fashions appear in the near future. We now shrink from healthy, bized waists and short skirts as ugly and answomanly, but "if they were worn' how soon they would become beautiful to our sight.

As long ago as 1851 an effort was made towards reform in dress, and the bloomer costume was introduced, but its stay was short. In 1856 a convention was called to discuss the question, and again in 1857, and many sensible articles were written upon the subject. The next reform movement was in the 70's. In February, 1891, the first convention of the National Council of Women was held, Miss Frances Willard presiding, and there it was "resolved" that this convention should kleadily work for hygienic dress reform.

There will be a discussion on this subject in the Woman's Council at the World's Fair, and it is expected that numbers in attendance will wear the approved costume. The question is asked: What has been gained in the movement of the last 40 years? To this we may reply considerable—especially in the matter of underclothing. Woman is looking and hoping for a dress in which she can walk and work and play. And in order to bring about this reform we must make women see the wrong they are doing themselves and their posterity, and when this is accomplished may we expect to see a change. And then, if not before, men will so appreciate their good taste and judgment that equal suffrage will be the order of the day.

Dr. Davis displayed considerable wit and humor and delighted her audience with her gracefulness of manner, and those

who failed to hear her missed a treat. Somerset Hall was full to the door. On account of the lecture several items of business were laid over till next meeting, which will be held on May 23, when the following subjects will be taken up: "Unfermented and home-made wines" and "Liquor in cookery."

It seems that the danger signals were not out and Schuler attempted to drive over the bridge. Next morning the horse was discovered standing in a ledge about 30 feet below the bridge. The buggy—almost a total wreck—was lodged in another place, and thus far no trace has been discovered of Schuler and Miss Kline. The bridge is 100 feet above the water, and the couple must have met instant death.

SABBATH DESECRATION

Alarmingly on the Increase in Montreal

Recommendations of the Synod.

Ottawa, May 10.—At the meeting of the synod to-day the report on Sabbath observance was this morning brought forward by Rev. J. Nichols, Montreal. Four of the six synods reported. In Montreal Sabbath desecration is alarmingly on the increase. Street cars running; candy, fruit and eigar stores and creameries open, many of these being cloaks for gambling. The contractors under the Dominion Government permitted their men to work Sunday on the construction of the bridge over the Lachine Canal, and the railways despatched even more trains on Sunday than any other day of the week.

It is stated that 500,000 persons are employed by the drink traffic alone, and 200,000 of these are young women.

The committee made recommendations to have the synod express pleasure that the World's Fair is not open Sunday; to urge parents to teach the evil of Sabbath desecration; censuring the Dominion Parliament for neglecting Mr. Charlton's Sabbath motion; to protest against all unnecessary Sunday labor, etc. The report was adopted.
