Canada and the United States. The American people are very sure, sooner or later, to realize that a new leaf must be turned in their relations with Canada. Enough time has now

elapsed to prove the fallacy of that theory of statesmanship, prevalent 30 years ago, which assumed that a policy of commercial non-intercourse could force the Canadians to seek political amalgamation with this republic. The theory, as stated by Gov. Boutwell in his book of reminiscences, was this: "The system of qualified intercourse tends to make the Canadian farmer dissatisfied with his condition, and as long as there are cheap lands in the United States he will find relief in emigration. The time, however, is not far distant when the Canadian farmer will be unable to sell his lands in the Dominion and with the proceeds secure a home in the States. When that times arrives he will favor annexation as a means of raising his own possessions to a value corresponding to the value of land in the States. The body of farmers, laborers and trading people will favor annexation, ultimately * * * and thus the union of the two countries will be secured."

If one examines the present situation he will find little in Canada to indicate that view. The cheap and fertile land of the United States is already practically exhausted; we have had "qualified intercourse" for a generation, yet there is no body of annexation sentiment in Canada today which a responsible statesman would regard as worthy of serious consideration. non-intercourse policy has failed politically and it is futile to expect po ical results from it in the future. time has come, therefore, to look upon the trade question as one of business and as one involving also the future peace and prosperity of the North American continent under the two flags -the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes.-Springfield Republican.
