OTTAWA AT GOTHAMLarge Crowd of American Critics
Present to Study Canadian
Game.

THE OPEN PLAY FAVORED

But Several of the Big Fellows Say
Style is Too Slow—Score Was
11 to 6.

New York, Dec. 11.—The Hamilton and Ottawa, Ont., football teams, two of the leading clubs of Canada, gave an exhibition game of Rugby, as played in Canada, at Van Cortlandt Park this afternoon, before a representative gathering of the best American football authorities and a vast crowd of spectators, who had been attracted by a desire to see the game which has been heralded by some as the successor of American college football as now played. Hamilton won, 11 to 6.

The game began shortly after 3 o'clock, in the presence of a crowd estimated to contain upwards of 30,000 persons.

Ross Williams, Williams College; Percy Houghton, Harvard coach; Capt. "Ted" Coy, of the Yale team; and Walter Camp, the dean of football authorities.

Open Play Favored.

Not understanding the rules of play at first, the crowd was apathetic, but as the play advanced there was more enthusiasm, and at the conclusion the public was unmistakably friendly to the game.

The rules committee of the American Collegiate Football Association meets in this city during Christmas week, and it is expected that its members, nearly all of whom witnessed the game today, will consider a revision of the rules, bearing in mind the Rugby game as exhibited today. Among the head coaches, trainers and other American authorities there seemed to be a consensus of opinion that the open play and entire absence of mass play in the Rugby game is responsible for the few accidents which have resulted.

LACROSSE CHIEFS IN
BUSINESS SESSIONQuestion of Paid President Discussed
—Rules Remain Unchanged.

Montreal, Dec. 11.—The executive of the National Lacrosse Union met here this afternoon to discuss the business of the past season and make suggestions on the changes in the rules for next year.

All clubs were represented except the Capitals. The principal business discussed was the question of a paid president. It was suggested by Jimmy Murphy, of Toronto, that the president be paid \$250 a year, and conduct the affairs of the union, including the appointment of the referee. Montreal and Nationals favored the suggestion, while St. Michaels and Cornwallis were against it. The question was divided, Quebec in the majority.

The Howard-George Finlayson incident in the last game of the season caused a brief discussion, but no action was taken.

The rules were gone over, but few changes of any importance were made. It was suggested that the annual meeting be held alternately in each city represented in the union, to which all agreed.

LAMY REINSTATED
BY SKATING UNION

Alleged Failure to Register Kept
Title From New Yorker.

Chicago, Dec. 11.—Lamy, of Saranac Lake, N.Y., was reinstated here tonight as amateur skating champion of "United States" and Canada at the annual meeting of the International Skating Union of America.

Lamy's appeal from the decision of expulsion of the Eastern Amateur Skating Association of March 1, 1909, for an alleged failure to compete at Cleveland, O., Jan. 30, not only was favorably acted upon by the International Union, but a resolution was adopted in effect that Secretary E. H. Coupe, of the Eastern Amateur Skating Union, be removed from his office within fifteen days "for conduct on his part prejudicial to the interest of skating."

Among those who attended the international meeting were: President Louis Rubenstein, of Montreal; Vice-President John Harding, of Saranac Lake, N.Y.; E. G. Westlake, Chicago; and 62 delegates from 15 countries, including James Boswell, Winnipeg.

The lead which they obtained early today was still theirs at five minutes to 10 tonight, when the other teams were called from the track for the final exhibition between the two champions, which Rutt won in 3 minutes 15 seconds by only six inches.

LONGBOAT BEAT SHERRING

Took Ten-Mile Event at Peterboro Saturday Night in 52:50.

MEN WILL BE NAMED
BY BAN B. JOHNSONUmpireBribing Scandal of 1908
World's Series Will Be
Dug Up Again.

SCAPEGOAT WAS USED

Fellow Who Was Ordered Out of Ball
Parks at Time Merely a Catspaw.

Chicago, Dec. 11.—President Ban Johnson, of the American League, who returned from a hunting trip with Charles A. Coniskey today, declared that he would furnish a sensation for the gathering of baseball magnates in New York next week by naming the men connected with the alleged umpire bribing scandal of the Chicago-New York series of 1908. "I came into possession of considerable new evidence in the matter last summer," said Johnson, "and if necessary will produce it. The man named was merely a scapegoat for others."

No More Barnstorming.

Johnson also stated that he intended to make a protest against the practice of allowing baseball players to go on "barnstorming" trips during the off-season.

His plan to stop this practice, which he will present at the American League meeting, is to sign all players to yearly contracts. In this way the club owners will control player activities throughout the entire twelve months.

President Johnson reiterated his declaration that the American League would continue to play a 154-game schedule, regardless of the action of the National League.

Charles A. Coniskey, president of the Chicago American League, also was present, and announced that he would be willing to lengthen the schedule to 168 games.

MULLIN LED PITCHERS

Chicago, Dec. 12.—George Mullin, of the Detroit champions, was the leading pitcher in the American League last season, according to the official pitching and fielding averages.

Issued by President B. B. Johnson here today, Mullin's record was 29 games won and 8 lost for a percentage of .784.

He pitched 62 1/2 innings, gave up 34 runs, 34 hits, 21 errors, 34 bases on balls, 11 walks, 3 home runs, 11 strikeouts, 3 to 1.

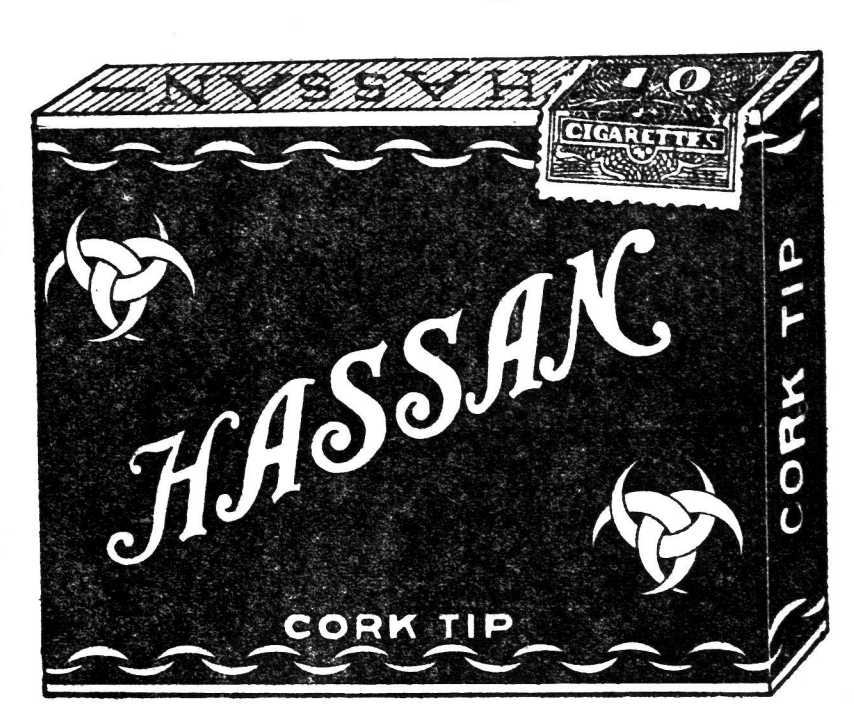
