## LONDON AND DISTRICT

## Splendid Work Done By Victoria Order of Nurses in London

The entire trend of the annual meeting of the Victorian Order of Nurses, held last night in Wesley Hall, appeared to point towards the need of a third nurse to carry on the work in London. Excellent as have been the labors of the two nurses employed with the recent annexations to the city the field is so large that they are not able to answer promptly the numerous calls received. The report of the secretary, Mrs. (Dr.) Moorhouse, was a most comprehensive one, showing that some 250 cases had been made during the past year, and 645 cases nursed. Special mention was made of the efficiency and devotion of the nurses, Misses Edwards and Pettit, who respond loyally to all demands. A part of their work lies among the foreign settlers in the city.

## Strangers' Friend Work.

A second branch of the work in London is that of the Strangers' Friend and the relief committee in connection with the order, these being the best means to supplement the nurses' attention by visiting needy families and supplying clothing where necessary, and pure milk for sickly babies.

It was pointed out that the aim of the Victorian Order was not charity, as when ever possible a small fee is collected for each visit, but rather to educate ignorant mothers in matters of health and sanitation. The Victorian Order workers are invariably left the warning that the three D's—dirty, disease and death—go hand in hand.

## Work in Northwest.

The report also showed where good work was done by Victorian order nurses in lonely districts of the Canadian Northwest among homesteaders, among the Indians, and in many other localities of Canada.

An expression of regret followed the mention of the withdrawal of Mesdames Boomer and Yarker as president and treasurer of the board. These offices will be held by Mrs. (Mrs.) Hodgins and Mrs. F. F. Harper, the retiring officers becoming advisors, president and first vice-president respectively.

Other speakers at the meeting last night were Mayor Graham, who presided, Rev. Richard Whiting, Dr. W. H. Hill, of the Institute of Public Health, Dr. Moorhouse and Mrs. Boomer.

## Man and Woman Duel With Knives

## Crossing Watchman Meets With Accident

Failing to escape in time from the path of a string of empty freight cars, which had been loosened from a running string from engine 1430, John Campbell, 310 Talbot street, aged about 68, a crossing watchman at the Grand Trunk Talbot street crossing, was struck and seriously injured about 4 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. He is at present in Victoria Hospital, and latest reports state that he is recovering nicely.

The wheels passed over his right foot near the ankle, crushing the bones in that part of the leg. He also sustained cuts and bruises about the head. This is the second accident which has happened to watchmen on the G. T. R. within three months. In January, Henry Mahon was injured at the Ridout street crossing in a somewhat similar manner. Mahon is still in the hospital. He had one of his legs amputated a short time ago.

## MANITOBA'S SEEDING.

Winnipeg, April 11.—Seeding will be general in Manitoba by the middle of next week. This would be very nearly the same day as last year, April 15. In a very few districts the snow is still on the ground, but is rapidly disappearing. Seeding operations appear to have been delayed more by wet fields than from weather causes, although in some districts rainfalls have delayed the farmer after the usual spring moisture had dried up.

Little wheat seeding has been done, but discing, harrowing and a general increase in the plowed area reported from some localities.

## DOFFERIN PARK BOUGHT BY IMPERIAL OIL CO.

May Be the Site for Big New Oil Stove Factory.

Sarnia, April 11.—The Imperial Oil Company has purchased Dofferin Park in the southern part of Sarnia, and in close proximity to its present plant, from the town for the sum of \$5,500.

The purchase has been contemplated for over a year, but the actual transaction did not take place till this week.

The Indians of the Sarnia Reserve had a title to the property, but this was deemed over the town last year, it is understood, on condition that the proceeds of the sale of the park be used to purchase another park site in some other part of the town. This condition will be carried out by the municipality.

The acquisition of the land by the Imperial Oil Company looks as if the company have further extensive building operations in view, and it is rumored that the construction of an oil stove factory may be erected on this site.

## MUST VACATE SEAT

Radical Member of British Commons Victim of Old Act.

London, April 11.—Sir Stuart Montagu, Radical member of Parliament from the Whitechapel division of London, and one of the leading bankers, must vacate his seat in Parliament, owing to his firm having last year become purchasers of silver for the Indian Government.

The judicial committee of the Privy Council today decided that he must give up his seat, basing its judgment on an old act of Parliament under which members of the House may not be even indirectly interested in such a transaction or in any Government contracts.

## SLIDE AT CULEBRA CUT

Giant Shoulder of Rock and Earth Moves Into Panama Canal.

Washington, D. C., April 11.—A giant shoulder of rock that for the past few years has prevented a mountain of earth from slipping into Culebra Cut, in the Panama Canal, at last has given way, and according to officials reports received today, the slide has moved into the canal prism at that point, and beside this many other slides were engaged in terracing the banks and in miscellaneous operations.

As a result the obstacle has been so far overcome that the excavator has reached grade in all but 8,000 feet of the ten miles length of the cut. By Oct. 1 five and a half million yards of material will have been taken out by the steam shovels, when the water will be turned on and the shovel will retreat before the dredges, leaving between two and three million cubic yards of material to be removed. Up to Jan. 31 last the United States Government had expended on the canal \$21,702,630.55.

## VAST ARMY TO STRIKE IN BELGIUM, MONDAY

Socialists Expect to Call Out Nearly Half-a-Million Workers.

[Canadian Press.]  
Brussels, Belgium, April 11.—Determination to resist with all its resources the general strike of Belgian workers to enforce the grant of manhood suffrage which has been arranged for Monday, appears to be the intention of the Belgian cabinet which has the support of the monarchy and the conservative interests of the country. On the other hand the Socialists seem to be firm in their decision to call out from 300,000 to 400,000 men. The local strike committees are showing the greatest activity in arranging to feed indigent strikers and in placing the children with sympathizers beyond the frontier. The workmen have been admonished that the best means of demonstrating their fitness for the suffrage is to display restraint and calm and peaceful endurance.

**Daily Councils of Cabinet.**  
The members of the cabinet hold daily councils to consider the situation. Two currents of opinion seem to prevail among them. The first is that the general strike will not succeed, as it will be only feebly supported by the workmen. The second is that in case the strike should become general order must be severely maintained and anybody desiring to work must be protected in exercising the right.

The workers' unions in many districts throughout the country took a vote last night on the question of joining in the strike. At Herstal of the 3,000 employees of the National

Arms factory, 2,700 voted in favor of the movement. The metal workers of Vieille Montagne adjourned without voting.

The Typographical Union of the city of Brussels showed little sympathy with the strike, and the members decided to remain at work. In other places, however, the Typographical Union resolved to strike, in some instances by a unanimous vote.

**G. T. P. WANTS WORKERS.**  
Fort William, April 11.—Two thousand laborers will be needed by the Grand Trunk Pacific between Cochrane and Armstrong this summer, according to M. W. Burroughs, a railway contractor. Steel is laid 80 miles east of Cochrane, and by the end of the summer conditions will warrant a regular train service between Cochrane and Superior Junction.
